## The Vicar writes

Issue 1 Volume 1 of EPN was published in 1871, then called "Home Words - The Ewell Parish Magazine". It's interesting to see how much remains the same nearly 150 years later. From the registers, we have baptisms and burials, as now (there were seven baptisms and four burials in January 1871). There is a calendar of upcoming events, as now, although the events then included clothing club, penny bank, night school, Bible Union, and women's class. The financial report focusses on charitable giving, with ten pounds five shillings and fourpence in the collection on New Year's Day to support the sick and poor, and many other charitable objects supported. Giving, says the 1871 EPN, "is an opportunity given by God to call into active exercise those feelings and principles of love which are but sparks kindled by his love to us." Later in the year, the churchwardens held a collection to help those injured in an explosion in Ewell's gunpowder mills, raising £88/10/8, an amazing total for the time.

There are also many differences between the first EPN and the latest: for example, there is no colour printing in 1871's EPN, or indeed photographs of any kind. Perhaps the most interesting things to read are the words of the Vicar, Sir George Glyn, explaining the purpose of EPN:

"Several attempts have been made to introduce a local magazine which will supply you with interesting and instructive reading as well as parish news of general or public interest. These attempts have as yet not succeeded, partly from want of support on your part, and also from a general want of interest in the Magazine... We hope to insert more local intelligence- accounts of parish meetings, cricket matches, and any events of general interest free of expense, and shall be much obliged of any information which shall be forwarded to us for insertion."

I do not know anything about the failed earlier attempts at a magazine, but the 1871 attempt did succeed and it is still going strong all these years later. You will note the intention to include news of general and public interest, which included the local train times and Post Office regulations. I see that the lending library was only open for one hour in the week in those days! In the next couple of issues there are articles about Ewell in the Domesday Book, London city missions, the reason for offertory collections in the church, and plans to enlarge the church with the completion of the north aisle. Some of the matters of wider village interest, such as train times, aren't needed in today's EPN. They are succeeded in spirit, though, by Kalli's new regular column about wider Ewell life, which you can find in this EPN.

What of the future of EPN? Can we look forward to another hundred and forty-seven years? Of course, there are many new media around now which hadn't been dreamed of in 1871. Ultimately, the answer comes down, as it did in that first issue, to "support on your part" and "interest in the Magazine". While the EPN is supported by contributors and interest is expressed by subscribers, I think it will continue to have an important place in the life of our church and village community. But I would re-iterate the request made by my

The usual pattern is our all-age **Praise@11** on the first Sunday at 11am; 11.15am **Choral Mattins** on the second Sunday; 11am **Toddle Up**, a short and very informal service for toddlers and their families on the third Sunday; and 11.15am **Morning Prayer with Holy Baptism** on the fourth Sunday. The pattern changes on special occasions: see the calendar on the back page for details of this month.

**1700 Second Sunday of the month ALL-IN** An inclusive all-age service with something for everyone. Followed at 6pm-6:45pm by Club Sandwich, a youth group for 7-11s.

**1730 Once a month CHORAL EVENSONG** Just like a cathedral Evensong in our own parish church. Usually the third Sunday but see the calendar on the back page for details.

Occasionally there are variations from this pattern; details are given in this paper, on the Notice Board or in the Weekly Notes available on Sundays.

### ON WEEKDAYS

Morning prayer is *usually* said at 9 am Tuesdays, in church. See the Weekly Notes or phone ahead to make sure. The Eucharist is celebrated on Tuesdays at 10 am, at the Side Chapel.

## IN CHURCH IN JUNE

Every Sunday our worship begins with a quiet and simple celebration of Holy Communion at 8am. At 9:30am, the Sung Eucharist includes hymns, choral music, a sermon and Holy Communion, with children's hour (Sunday school) and coffee afterwards. The other services vary each Sunday in the month.

On Sunday 3 June, our monthly Praise@11 service is getting out and about, taking a close up look at Creation with a walk along the Hogsmill to Ewell Court. We meet at 11am in church, bring boots or walking shoes. We will have a picnic around noon at Ewell Court, please bring a picnic; we will then walk back to church. An event for all ages, young and old, families and individuals, all welcome. We may even see a Kingfisher or Little Egret on the way. In case of very bad weather we will have a prayer trail and picnic in church.

At 11:15am on Sunday 10 June, our parish choir leads the singing at Choral Mattins, the traditional Prayer book service. In the evening, our all-age service All-in starts at 5pm and we think about the story of David and Goliath. It's followed at 6pm by Club Sandwich, our youth group for 7-11s.

Please note that the following week, from Tuesday 12 June - Friday 15 June there is no access to church while improvement works to the AV system are carried out. There will be no services on Tuesday 12 June for this reason. The parish office will also be closed during this week and the following week i.e. 11 June - 22 June. Email and answerphone messages will let enquirers know whom to contact during this period, and appointments can be made to meet in the office but it will not be generally open.

On Saturday 16 June, there is a garden party at the Vicarage, organized by our church's Social Committee: Elaine, William, and I would love to see you there 2:30pm-4:30pm. Tickets are available after services or from the office, £5 for adults, £1 for children. There will be food and entertainment, and some games likes quoits and giant Connect 4 especially (but not exclusively) for children.

The late morning service on Sunday 17 June is Toddle Up! at 11am: our monthly services especially for toddlers which is short and very informal. In the evening at 5:30pm our monthly service of Choral Evensong is held. This is the last Choral Evensong before the summer break, and the Evensong will conclude with Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament.

Sunday 24 June is midsummer, and the festival of the Birth of St John the Baptist. There is a service of Morning Prayer with Holy Baptism at 11:15am. In the afternoon, 2-5pm there is a free event for all the family in the grounds of Bourne Hall, run by Churches Together in Ewell, called HOPE. St Mary's plans to run a games stall involving giant Jenga, giant Connect 4, and Molky (Finnish skittles). We are looking for help to set-up and run the stall. It's great fun for all the family- last year we had a brilliant time on the stall, do please be in touch if you can help, and we look forward to seeing you there.

The last of our recitals before the summer break is on Saturday evening, 30 June, starting at 7:30pm. It's the ever-popular multi-piano recital, including many pairs of hands on several pianos- simultaneously! Always a great evening of music, you can pay on the door £8 (£1 for under 16s) or £7 on the eventbrite website.

The reality is that the foodbank is just a sticking plaster on a need and we need to all come together to address the root issues.

# BARBARA CANNON

Barbara was born in London on 13 June 1929. She lived in London with her parents and older brother Dennis. A younger brother, Derek, died at a year old when she was about 3.

Barbara went to the nearby Michael Faraday school until she was 10. At the start of WW2 she was evacuated to South Petherton in Somerset with her brother Dennis. Initially Barbara was placed with a young couple who had just had a baby and they really did not want another child in the house and Barbara was very unhappy. Her brother was with a lovely couple, who did not have children of their own, and they took Barbara in as well. Aunty and Pop Wines, as she and Den called them, provided a caring and happy home for them which helped ease the pain of being taken away from family at such a young age. Barbara and Den went



to school in the village but only part time as the school could not accommodate all the evacuees and local children at the same time. Being evacuated together forged an even closer bond between Mum and Den who remained best friends as well as brother and sister until Den's death in 2001

Barbara and Den stayed in Somerset for a couple of years and by the time they returned the family had moved to the Tolworth/Surbiton area where Barbara went to Tolworth Central school. She liked school and was good at English and arithmetic but always worried that she was not very clever, and that people would not find her interesting company. Barbara was much cleverer than she allowed herself to believe and everyone who knew her loved her and being in her company.

After finishing school Barbara worked in the office at a local builder where she met Frank Cannon, the GPO engineer who came to install a new switchboard for the company. A week later Frank phoned the office, ostensibly, to check all was well with the switchboard but really to ask Barbara out. This was the beginning of their 54 years together and Barbara and Frank married in St Andrews church Surbiton in March 1952.

After they married Barbara and Frank moved to the house, built by Frank's father, on Ewell by Pass. They lived there for 35 years and had 2 daughters Kathy born in 1955 and Rosie born in 1958. Barbara and Frank hosted many birthday and firework parties and other gatherings of family and friends in the large gardens at this house and everyone was always guaranteed a warm welcome and wonderful food prepared by Barbara.

Just over 30 years ago Barbara and Frank moved to the house in London Road - even closer to the church they both loved so much and were both so involved with. They were regular members of the congregation throughout their life together. Barbara used to help at the crèche and The Woman's World Day of Prayer. She was also heavily

involved in the Women's Fellowship and formed part of 'Gertie's Girls (also known as the Social Committee) and could always be relied on to give a helping hand at the village fair. Barbara also helped with coffee mornings, coach trips, brass cleaning and more. She supported Frank very well during his time as churchwarden and was a huge supporter of the choir, helping at parties, etc. Barbara had the unique ability to be a friend to everyone. Frank died, weeks after their 51st wedding anniversary. The family worried how Barbara would manage and are so proud of how she did cope. Barbara's love of the church, her church family and being involved helped her so much in rebuilding her life on her own.

Barbara became housebound in 2013 and found her loss of independence and need to rely on others very hard at first. This was greatly helped by the lovely carers from Bluebird. They loved working with Barbara because she was always so interested in and concerned about them and starting the day with their visits full of warmth and humour made such a difference.

Barbara was very proud of her 5 grandchildren: - Mark, Adam, Laura, Chris and Tom and her great grandson, Frankie, born in July last year.

Contacting Barbara's friends, family and carers to invite them to her funeral was such a hard thing to do but hearing so many people talk so fondly about her and why they loved her too was heart-warming: -

'Loving, kind and generous and would do anything she could to help people'

'More concerned about others than herself'

'An amazing lady who would help anyone'

'She had a beautiful smile and infectious laugh'

'She will leave a gap in the lives of everyone who knew her'

Barbara was all this and so much more to her family. She was a very special Mum, Nanny and Great Nanny, we all loved her very much and will always miss her love, kindness, support and laughter. We all have our own very happy memories that we will remember with love and hold in our hearts forever.

## MONEY MATTERS Financial Summary 3 months to 31 March 2018

The deficit for the first quarter is £1,518 less than the budget but £668 more than the previous year

Income is £140 lower than budget and £785 lower than last year. Voluntary income is lower offset by higher fees from weddings and funerals and rental income from the playing field.

Expenditure is £1,658 less than budget. There are a number of small underspends but these are expected to be just timing differences. Costs are £117 higher than last

year with the parish share being £768 higher but with lower maintenance costs to date offsetting most of this.

These figures are the normal running expenses and income for the church. They exclude legacies and monies spent on capital and pastoral projects funded from legacies given in previous years.

The Vicar and the PCC extend their thanks to you all, for your ongoing support to St Mary's.

We understand that not everyone will feel able to buy or sell tickets but we will be most grateful if you can help with this fund raising project.






