## The Vicar writes

From time-to-time it is our privilege at St Mary's to welcome visitors to church services who are staying in the area, perhaps visiting family or friends. For churches who live in tourism hotspots- on the coast, for example- this is a major part of their ministry week-by-week. A few such churches even ask visitors to stand up and say where they have come from. Though I must admit I have never felt like standing up and announcing myself from the pew, I have always felt a warm welcome whenever I have been to church on holiday.

When we are lucky enough to travel, it can bring many great experiences and opportunities. I'm looking forward to our own summer holiday to the Outer Hebrides later this summer. As well as seeing for the first time a very different part of the UK, I am hopeful we may see some eagles and perhaps whales and dolphins while we are there.

Going to church while on holiday is just one part of that experience, but an important one. It can remind us that the one holy, catholic and apostolic is not just our regular home church, but exists in every place. While there is the temptation to 'skip' church on holiday, I find that the exposure to a different church and congregation can really inspire and re-vivify one's faith. It can make more real to us the fact that we are part of the Body of Christ beyond our own congregation. When we visit a church they will do things a bit differently to the way with which we are familiar, but that too is a good and broadening experience. Sometimes people bring home a pew sheet, or welcome leaflet, or a good idea seen in a church elsewhere that might be useful at St Mary's.

If you are looking for a church when in Europe, do remember the Church of England's Diocese in Europe: most major cities have an English-language Anglican church. Elsewhere, especially in commonwealth countries, there are usually Anglican churches. But of course almost any church will warmly welcome a visitor, whatever denomination they are part of. When I see visitors at a communion service at St Mary's, I often make known our church's rule: the Church of England welcomes all baptized Christians who usually receive communion in their own church to do so with us. Conversely, it is left to Anglicans who may be visiting churches of other traditions to follow their own conscience and any local rules about who may receive communion there. And of course it is perfectly fine, on any occasion, to go to church and not receive Holy Communion, for whatever reason.

If you are going away over the summer months, I wish you a very happy holiday and safe travelling. And if you are staying in Ewell over the next few months, I hope you will be able to enjoy some fine weather and something of the beautiful part of the world which we are privileged to call home.

The Sunday School meets in conjunction with this service in term time. There is coffee in the church hall between the 9.30 and 11 o'clock services on Sunday mornings, to which all are welcome, and especially newcomers and visitors.

#### LATE MORNING SERVICE varies by Sunday in the month

The usual pattern is our all-age **Praise@11** on the first Sunday at 11am; 11.15am **Choral Mattins** on the second Sunday; 11am **Toddle Up**, a short and very informal service for toddlers and their families on the third Sunday; and 11.15am **Morning Prayer with Holy Baptism** on the fourth Sunday. The pattern changes on special occasions: see the calendar on the back page for details of this month.

**1700 Second Sunday of the month ALL-IN** An inclusive all-age service with something for everyone. Followed at 6pm-6:45pm by Club Sandwich, a youth group for 7-11s.

**1730 Once a month CHORAL EVENSONG** Just like a cathedral Evensong in our own parish church. Usually the third Sunday but see the calendar on the back page for details.

Occasionally there are variations from this pattern; details are given in this paper, on the Notice Board or in the Weekly Notes available on Sundays.

### ON WEEKDAYS

Morning prayer is *usually* said at 9 am Tuesdays, in church. See the Weekly Notes or phone ahead to make sure. The Eucharist is celebrated on Tuesdays at 10 am, at the Side Chapel.

## CHURCH HALL REDECORATION

## IN CHURCH IN JULY

Every Sunday we have a quiet 8am service of Holy Communion, and a Sung Eucharist at 9:30am. At the 9.30am service there is also children's hour, our Sunday school, which continues until 15 July and then breaks for the summer.

On Sunday 1 July, Praise@11 is our monthly all-age service at 11am, and we will be demonstrating "Open the Book". This is a way of telling Bible stories through drama which we and Christ Church Ewell do at Ewell Grove School every week. Those interested in seeing what we do are especially invited to this short and informal service even if you aren't a regular in this congregation.

From Sunday 29 July throughout August there are no late morning or evening services, but the 8am and 9:30am services continue throughout.

## AN EVENING THAT COULDN'T 'B' BEATEN

It is a remarkable coincidence that so many of the great theologians' names begin with 'A': Aquinas, Augustine, Anselm, Ambrose, and so on. For composers of organ music, the significant letter seems to be 'B', if the recital on 26 May was anything to go by. Simon Gregory treated us to music by Bruhns, Byrd, Boyce, Bonnet, Bach, Bedard, Bovet and more. We had all heard some Boyce recently at the royal wedding, but some of the other composers were less well-known. Byrd is one of my favourites, although probably even better known for his choral works, and appropriately enough his Miserere and Veni Creator Spiritus were closely based on plainsong chants. Bach's magisterial Passacaglia and Fugue provided a cavalcade of notes, somehow kept in precise order by Bach's composition and Simon's skilful playing. The final piece, Bovet's Hamburger Totentanz, is not often heard in church, offered an ending to the evening both humorous and triumphant in its final, magnificent crescendo. We look forward to welcoming Simon back as one of the team in June's multi-handed piano recitals.

## TWENTY YEARS ON

On a sunny morning on 28 June 1998 by 10am Guildford Cathedral was buzzing and full to overflowing as the family and friends of nineteen ordinands took their seats. They had gathered from far and wide to celebrate the completion by the ordinands of three years training and to witness their ordination by the Bishop of Guildford as deacons in God's church. Meanwhile, in the Chapter House, the nineteen were taking the Oath of Allegiance to Her Majesty the Queen and the Oath of Canonical Obedience to the Bishop of Guildford. They also made a Declaration of Assent affirming and declaring their belief in 'the faith which is revealed in the Holy Scriptures and set forth in the catholic creeds and to which the historic formularies of the Church of England bear witness'. I was one of that nervous group. The previous night I hadn't slept a wink as our three day ordination retreat at St Columba's House, Woking drew to a close!

The Declarations or 'promises' we all made that day, with the intent of being 'heralds of Christ's kingdom' were weighty. Not surprising then that the response several times was 'By the help of God, I will.' Bishop John Gladwin exhorted us "Remember always with thanksgiving that the people among whom you will minister are made in God's image and likeness. In serving them you are serving Christ himself, before whom you will be



called to account." I can still remember kneeling before Bishop John for the ordination as he laid his hands on my head and prayed "Send down the Holy Spirit on your servant Sue for the office and work of a deacon in your Church."

That was twenty years ago. The first church where I served was St Andrew's, Oxshott. I was there for four years before going to St Mary's, Cuddington, which is my parish church. From there I went to St Mary's, Long Ditton and finally - on 5 February 2012 - came here to serve the congregation and community of St Mary's, Ewell. I have written some words (aside) which seek to express my feelings about twenty years of ministry.

I would like to say a BIG 'thank you' to you - for all your support, encouragement, fellowship and friendship. It is a joy and privilege to be serving at Ewell. As the author of psalm 16 wrote 'The lines have fallen for me in pleasant places; I have a goodly heritage' (verse 16).

At St Mary's, Ewell, on 8 July during the 9.30am Sung Eucharist we shall together be celebrating the 20th anniversary of my ordination as deacon. I would love to see you there.

## ORGAN RECITAL Saturday 28 April, 2018

An excellent recital that again displayed the capacity of Ewell's 'Father' Willis organ.

On the colourful first page of his programme notes, Jonathan Holmes says: "Two great organ works from Paris (Louis Vierne, organist of Notre-Dame) and Bournemouth (Percy Whitlock, organist at Bournemouth St. Stephen's and Bournemouth Pavilion)".

Pictures in the programme of Eiffel Tower and Bournemouth Pier could both be said to encapsulate some of the qualities of the music we heard. For the Frenchman, Paris was his home and, it could be said, the source behind much of his organ music. For in May 1900, at the age of thirty, he won the prestigious prize of organist at the Cathedral of Notre-Dame. The organ there had earlier been rebuilt by the famous organ builder Aristide Cavallé-Coll (whom 'our' Willis met). Tonight, Jonathan played the Symphony No. 2 for organ, composed in 1902, a time when Vierne had settled into his new job, and when, for the time being, life was good. The work comprises five movements: i) allegro (fast); ii) choral; iii) scherzo (an Italian word meaning joke); iv) cantabile (another Italian word, this time meaning 'in a singing style'); v) final.

Life, for the Englishman Whitlock, proceeded along different lines. Throughout his life, Whitlock wanted to be a cathedral organist, yet he always failed the selection procedure. He ended up at St. Stephen's Parish Church, Bournemouth, in 1930 and there enjoyed a generous salary and a fine church building in a seaside town that well suited him. Two years later, he took on the job of part-time Borough Organist at the new Bournemouth Pavilion; in due course that became full-time and, in 1935, he resigned from St. Stephen's. Most of the music he wrote was small in scale; once he had left St. Stephen's he felt able to tackle larger pieces. One such is the four-movement Organ Sonata in C minor dating from 1934. In the music are all sorts of echoes of other composers, notably Rachmaninov – whose Second Symphony Whitlock admired – and Elgar who also wrote an organ sonata and who had died earlier that year. Whitlock dedicated the Sonata to Dorothy L. Sayers, author of the Lord Peter Wimsey detective stories. There are four movements, the first and last being in serious mood and the shorter middle movements lighter in spirit. It was said of Whitlock the organist that he liked to end his recitals quietly and scuttle away "like a little mouse", rather than in a blaze of glory. Such is the end of his Sonata where the music dies away from a climax to nothing.

We are, of course, immensely grateful to all who give support to the Grand Draw either by donating prizes or buying and selling tickets.




