## The Vicar writes

What was the first thing Jesus did when he began his three year ministry? He called his disciples. Or, as we might put it in today's lingo, he gathered his team around him. Even Jesus, even the Son of God, worked in a team, rather than alone.

For those of us who try to continue Jesus's work, in the ways we can in our own communities, we too need to be part of a team. Jesus's work is continued today by the church. The word church means 'gathering'. In other words, we cannot do what God calls us to do alone. We have to gather. We have to be a team. This is true when we pray and worship:- some sing, some read, some look after the House of God, some keep the prayers rising when other are distracted. Together we are a team offering the work of prayer. And it's true for everything else we do as well.

At St Mary's, our estates committee which keeps our church and churchyard so well maintained, is a team. The social committee, the Fair committee, the groups who run our children's activities, those who steward our finances, ring bells, arrange flowers, put together our publicity and EPN, we work as teams. We can only put on our bereavement café or hold our events and charitable activities, because people work as a team. I could go on and fill a page with examples.

On the board outside the front of our church, next to Vicar it says my name. But if this gives anyone the idea that I do everything, they are very much mistaken. What St Mary's does and is relies on literally scores of people, perhaps hundreds. Thanks be to God for all those who are involved.

Our teams grow all the time as people get involved in different ways. But we mark this month a significant addition as a new priest joins our ministry team. Canon Margaret Marsh introduces herself in these pages. We look forward to her ministry among us. Then in September, our new children's and families worker, Leanne Newman, will be joining the team. She will be supporting and leading all the teams who put together our wonderful provision of children's groups and services.

I am reflecting at the moment how the growth of our team impacts on the shape of my own ministry. Just as Jesus spent a lot of his time with his disciples, wise leaders will give the key members of their team the time and support they need. To help our teams be the best they can, that may mean I step back from doing some things myself, and invest a little bit more

## BOLIVIA UPDATE

Richard White gave an update on his work in Bolivia at the Coffee Morning on Wednesday, 5 June. He volunteers at the young offenders' institute in Cochabamba, which houses both boys and girls. They enter up until the age of 17 and stay longer if necessary to complete their sentence. Offences can be serious including robbery, sexual violence, solvent/alcohol abuse and even murder. Day release is possible as they approach the end of their sentences.



Richard told us that most of them declare they have a faith, predominantly Christian, and they want to have a good relationship with God. They regret what they have done and are respectful. There is a lack of anger and violence within the institute, quite different to what we encounter in this country at places like Feltham. This was illustrated in photos of boys using knives in the kitchen and in other areas such as woodworking. The institute is run by the Social Services. Could this be what makes the difference?

An update was given on some of the young people featured in a previous presentation. Some were doing fine whereas others were struggling.

Richard thanked St. Mary's for the money that has been sent to help them. The first month after release is particularly important, especially if they have no family. Essentials such as a cooker, saucepans and a mattress need to be provided to get them started.

The talk was inspirational and uplifting. Richard's work is helping to change so many young lives and assisting them to lead a life away from crime. And it all started from watching "The Mission" (the 1986 Academy Award winning film about a Jesuit missionary's efforts to convert a remote native community to Christianity), which sparked an interest in South America. This led Richard to Latin Link and the rest, as they say, is history.

## CLIMATE CHANGE - MANY STEPS IN THE RIGHT DIRECTION

It's very easy to feel guilty or helpless when we so often hear on the news about more drought leading to lost crops for people who already have so little; about floods where they have never been before as close as Staines; about the biggest ever cyclone in Mozambique leaving millions homeless and when we see on our TV screens the pollution of the sea and sea life caused by plastic.



At the end of our Lent course this year Ben Niblett from Tearfund came to share some ideas about how we might make a difference for the better as individuals and as a church. Ben is a senior member of Tearfund's advocacy team and has won campaigns on climate change, water and sanitation and corruption. He encouraged us not to feel guilty about what we can't do but to focus on what we can do - out of love for God and for our neighbour and for the earth. He shared with us his top four tips which would be steps in the right direction -

- **Switch electricity to renewable sources** in our homes and churches. Ben gave us a website [www.tearfund.org/switch](http://www.tearfund.org/switch)
- **Drive less.** If you are able to use public transport, walk, cycle or share a car. Some people are switching to an electric car but this isn't for everyone.
- **Fly less.** Not taking one flight makes a difference. Can you take a train or Skype/Facetime?
- **Eat less meat.** (Cows and sheep breathe out methane, a powerful greenhouse gas.)

# ORGAN RECITAL Saturday 4 May 2019

## “NORTHERN LIGHTS”: an exploration of the organ music of Scandinavia by Jonathan Holmes

How many Scandinavian composers can you think of?

Most people, when asked this question, will probably answer ‘Sibelius’ (Finnish) and ‘Grieg’ (Norwegian). The knowledgeable few might even add ‘Nielsen’ (Danish) as well. There are, of course, many more than just these three: tonight’s recital acted as an introduction to their music, either written for organ or arranged for the instrument.

At first glance **Dietrich Buxtehude** counts as a German composer and not a Nordic one. He did, however, spend his working life as organist in the prosperous city of Lübeck on the Baltic Sea coast. Alone among German cities at the time, early 18th century, Lübeck did not become embroiled in constant warfare. The city tended to look north and trade with other Baltic states. Anyway, Buxtehude wrote a good deal of very fine music for organ including the *Prelude in F sharp minor* that opened tonight’s concert.

Though principally an orchestral composer, and a man who never held any organist’s position, the music of **Jean Sibelius** nevertheless sounds wonderful on the Willis organ. *Valse Triste* (sad waltz) was written as incidental music for a now-forgotten play but remains popular as a concert piece. Equally popular is the *Karelia Suite*. At the time of its composition, the province of Karelia was not in Finland at all, but part of Russia. A great patriot, Sibelius wrote a stirring piece - we heard two movements from the Suite, the *Intermezzo* and *Alla Marcia* - the first performance of which in 1893 put Finland on the map. It also did no harm whatsoever to Sibelius’ reputation

The ever-popular Piano Concerto belies **Edvard Grieg’s** talent which lay in the field of miniatures for piano, rather than in large-scale works. We heard *Wedding day at Troldhaugen*, one of the Lyric Pieces which Grieg wrote for his wife in celebration of their twenty-fifth wedding anniversary that took place in the village church at Troldhaugen.

**Oskar Lindberg** is one of Sweden’s leading composers and it was a privilege to hear some of his music performed tonight. He wrote fine music for the organ - he was organist at Engelsbrekt church in Stockholm - as well as for orchestra and small chamber ensembles. On the basis of what we heard tonight, he deserves to be better known in this country. Among his compositions, the *Organ Sonata in G minor, opus 23* stands out. Composed in 1924, this magnificent work is in four movements: opening with a lugubrious Funeral March, there follows an Adagio (slow) then a movement headed ‘Alla Sarabande’. A Sarabande is a kind of stately dance. The Finale of the sonata is an exhilarating allegro con brio - quick and with vigour. A short, cheerful Wedding piece by Lindberg came earlier in the programme. Lindberg came from the Dalarna area of Sweden, a rural area rich in folk tradition.

One of Europe’s leading organists of the first half of the twentieth century is **Gerard Bunk**. For most of his life, Bunk worked at the cathedral at Dortmund, Germany. Jonathan played his *Passacaglia in A minor, opus 40* comprising variations, double fugue and final quotation on the name BACH, which dates from 1911. I should point out that the name of Bach translates well into musical notation (German, that is)

and has for long been a popular theme for composers.

Though not himself an organist, **Carl Nielsen** loved the organ and composed a major piece for it, the *Commotio opus 58* dating from 1931. A one-movement piece it comprises many contrasting sections.

The Lindberg Sonata ended tonight’s concert. As an encore, Jonathan chose another piece by Lindberg, an arrangement of an old folk song from the Dalarna region. This delightful, rather moving piece brought the evening to a suitable conclusion.

After we had finished our picnics and a few had had a game of frisbee we said goodbye to our youngest walkers (riders!) and set off towards Epsom, then across to NESLOT before heading up to Warren Farm and Nonsuch Park. Some of the group were surprised by these hidden pockets of vast green spaces so close to home, vowing to visit them more often. Our route took us along the Ewell and Stoneleigh borders and along the busy Kingston Road before diving down a footpath towards Ewell Court. A welcome break was called for and treats including cake and milk shakes went down well. During the day some of our younger walkers had been tackling an observation quiz, and we all joined in spotting and identifying a number of bird species around the Ewell Court lake before heading back along the Hogsmill, eventually retracing our footsteps in to the village and to the church.

The organ music before the service was a medley of music from the 1920s and the choir was on top form. Russell's sermon neatly encompassed Patrick's wide-ranging career with some amusing anecdotes. The service ended with the presentation of a small gift to Patrick and the Toccata from Widor's 5th Symphony.

After the service Patrick and Susanne invited everyone to the hall for canapés and drinks. Valerie (Churchwarden) thanked Patrick and Susanne for the refreshments and we joined with her in toasting Patrick's health.





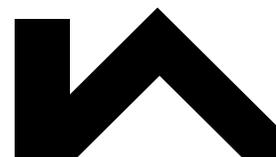
