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Fr Mark Stafford writes

THE JOY OF NOT SHOPPING

I know that shopping is for some the best thing in the world. It has become a hobby and a family activity. When I lived close to Sheffield, people would often talk about going for a day out to Meadowhall, the local out of town shopping centre.

You could arrive when it opened, have a McDonalds breakfast, do a bit of shopping then head to Nandos for lunch, more shopping, punctuated by the odd cappuccino and then an evening meal at the shopping centre pub and then into the cinema, all without seeing the light of day or having to pay for parking.

For many, shopping has changed from an essential chore to a joyous activity.

However, for others, shopping is a luxury that is often beyond their means. For some a trip to the shops is a carefully balanced activity. Looking carefully at the price of each item and waiting until late in the day to grab the yellow sticker bargains. For others the trip to the shops has been replaced by a visit to the food bank.

I often reflect on the change in our societal relationship with retail. As much as I don't enjoy shopping, I do accept that we need to shop, as after all it creates jobs, provides income, and maintains our economic wellbeing.

When I do have to go shopping, I try and shop in a more ethical and sustainable manner. Clothes from the charity shops, or where this is not possible, I try and buy from a company that I know has fair wage policies. Where possible I avoid large, multi-national chains and support local businesses, avoiding plastic wrappers, looking for fairtrade alternatives and ethical retailers.

When choosing a bank, the first question is "can I see your ethical policy?" rather than asking about interest rates.

Retail is here to stay and for some it will always be great fun and for others, a bit of a chore. No matter what our feelings towards shopping, it would be great if we could all be a little more mindful as to where we shop, the cost to the planet and the impact of our shopping on the lives of others. If we can afford to it would also be great if when we shop, we buy a little extra and make a donation to the food bank. (You can leave your donations at most supermarkets or bring them to Church.) 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PARISH CHOIR AT ST. ALBANS CATHEDRAL FOR PENTECOST



The Pentecost weekend saw the Parish Choir sing the services in St Albans Cathedral; the trip being re-arranged from 2020 as our 'booking' there was cancelled due to COVID. When the trip was fixed the Jubilee celebration dates had not been finalised, so we had to factor in a longer drive time around the M25 thanks to far more traffic being on the roads.

The cathedral virggers gave us a lovely welcome and we settled into the Song School on the Saturday afternoon to warm up. At 2.30pm we moved into the choir stalls having already sorted out the procession order and where to go. With very little time to practice on the Sunday morning, we rehearsed all the music for both days and stopped after an hour to get a drink and get ready for Choral Evensong at 4.00pm.

There was a reasonably-sized congregation for Evensong and we sang the Smith 5-part responses and the Ayleward Short Service setting we had sung at St Mary's the previous week. The anthem was the fabulous setting of "The Spirit of the Lord" by Edward Elgar; a perfect 'fit' for Pentecost.

After the service, we repaired to the pub (thirst after righteousness!) and went on to have a lovely meal together at a restaurant in the city centre. When we had finished, we went our separate ways - to accommodation booked or home depending on personal preference.

We arrived back for a 10.00am start in the Song School and ran over the music for the Eucharist going over to the cathedral for a 10-minute rehearsal at 10.50am. We then joined the previous service congregation for coffee before girding our loins for the 11.15am service. With a large congregation present, we sang the Hassler Mass "Missa Secunda", which is well known to the St Mary's congregation, and, during the Communion, "Listen, sweet dove" by Grayston Ives. Unbeknown to us the service was live-streamed, and you can listen to it on YouTube if you are interested. It was a joy to be given the option of receiving communion in both kinds!

After the service, we were thanked very warmly by both the Dean and the Precentor and given an open invitation to go back to sing for them. As we waited for the congregation to disperse so we could have a photograph, we were really pleased to have so many compliments and thanks from them as they genuinely appreciated our efforts.

The weekend went very well, and we kept St Mary's reputation at its high level. Exeter Cathedral next in October!

THE HOBBY OF BIRD WATCHING

For this, the last in my series of reflections on Birds and Bird watching, I have decided to talk about the sheer enjoyment there is in bird watching. I have been doing it since boyhood, and even after all this time find there is always something new to learn.

Extra keen bird watchers often travel miles to see a bird, particularly if they keep a checklist of sightings and want to update it. Personally, I am content to watch them in and around the borough. Saying that, however, I have gone abroad to watch birds notably to Spain and, whilst living in Budapest, into the Hungarian countryside. It was at one of their National Parks in the latter country that I was granted excellent advice. One of the Rangers there, who knew the vast landscape well, had heard that a rare bird had been spotted. Rather than going off looking for it, his advice was "never chase after a bird. Stay where you are, and let them come to you". Advice that holds true to this day.

One of Britain's most famous comedians is also famous for his birding, and that is Bill Oddie. He used to advise people on how to get the most out of their hobby; I propose listing some of these here. Although Bill usually writes about birdlife in the country, what he suggests is equally valid in places such as Ewell.

Moving. Always move quietly and carefully. Birds are easily 'spooked' by movement, and can take alarm and fly off.

Clothing. It is always best to wear dark clothes. Bright colours, spots or stripes may be all very well on the High Street, but not when you want to watch birds.

Looking. When out and about, always keep alert. Watch carefully for movements which may be a bird foraging - or it may only be a falling leaf.

Listening. Allied to the above is the art of listening, of keeping alert both to sights and sounds. Some bird calls are so highly-pitched as to be almost inaudible to the human ear. All I can say is that to hear these calls is down to practice.

Stalking. This is the skill that used to be confined to those hunting wildfowl for the pot. Yet the technique is the same. Sometimes you may need to get a closer view of a bird and the only way to do it is by moving cautiously, or even on hands and knees. You may even need to brave insect bites or scratches - but it is all worthwhile in the end.

Whispering. It is sometimes astonishing to hear how loudly some bird watchers, even experienced ones, talk when out 'in the field'. That is a real give-away, and any bird nearby has time to make itself scarce before they have realized it was there.

There are more suggestions Bill has to offer, but these are a few pointers that I have learned over the years. These may go some way toward getting more enjoyment out of the wonderful hobby of bird watching.

CHRISTMAS IS COMING....

It is only July you cry! We can't start thinking about Christmas yet; the summer holidays have not yet been and gone! However, no sooner have we returned from our summer holidays and families got their children ready for a new term at school, a new academic year, than the shops are beginning to set out their Christmas stock. It begins earlier and earlier each year but, no, here at St. Mary's, we have not succumbed to the rampant commercialism that we see all around us. **However**, we are once again preparing to think ahead in readiness for Christmas.



This year, St Mary's will be supporting the **LINK TO HOPE SHOEBOX APPEAL** which is UK based and has been sending shoe box gifts to Ukraine, Romania, Moldova, and Bulgaria since 1992. It isn't just

about gifts to children either, but whole families and isolated elderly people.



FAMILY SHOEBOX APPEAL

Shoeboxes of gifts are given to families who often must make a choice between buying food or fuel at Christmas time – buying presents is just not a priority. Many families do not have running water, heating, or electricity. Some live in appalling conditions, often living in just one or two rooms, and life for them is a real struggle to survive.

A shoebox for a family means that everyone receives a gift. A scarf for the mum, a small DIY tool for the dad, toys, and games for the children as well as stationery and coloured pens. Also, toiletries, toothpaste, shampoo, and soap to keep everyone clean and free from the germs that make them ill. And of course, sweets and chocolates for everyone – a family favourite.



ELDERLY SHOEBOX APPEAL

Due to the number of elderly people now living alone and isolated because their families are leaving to work away, Link to Hope has launched its Elderly Shoebox Appeal. The boxes are similar but with the children's games and education materials replaced with a wind-up torch, sensory items, candle, and holder etc.

Link to Hope send the boxes collected to **Romania, Bulgaria, Moldova, and Ukraine**. What a critical time to be sending them this year!

Link to Hope is a Christian Charity which continues to remain small enough that they continue to have a personal relationship with all their key contacts in Eastern Europe who distribute your Shoeboxes and they also do spot checks to ensure that the correct people receive your boxes.

OPEN THE BOOK



For several years now, together with a group of others from Christ Church (opposite Sainsbury's Local in Ewell Village), I have regularly been going into Ewell Grove Primary School to do something called 'Open the Book.' Open the Book is an exciting way to offer primary school children an opportunity to hear key Bible stories told by a team of Christians from local churches, who present the stories during assemblies or acts of collective worship. Each presentation takes around 10–15 minutes and, oh yes, we get to dress up and act out the Bible stories too! Before the pandemic, we would have had children dressing up as well but, things have not returned to 'normal' yet, so it is just us grown-ups for the moment. The children really love hearing the stories and join in enthusiastically with crowd responses or a very loud 'Amen' at the end of a simple prayer. It is a wonderful opportunity to reach out to so many children and their teachers as we can have between 60 and 120 or so people listening to our stories.

Two or three team members have now moved away, and we are looking to recruit new volunteers. We meet at Christ Church at 2.00pm on Tuesday afternoons during term time for a prayer and a quick read-through of the script. We then walk across to school with all our props and get ready in the school hall. After our story telling, we head back to Christ Church at around 3.00pm. EWELL VILLAGE JUBILEE CELEBRATION 5 JUNE



NORMAN HARPER'S ORGAN RECITAL 21 May

We were delighted to welcome guest organist Norman Harper to St. Mary's this evening. Assisted by his wife Marilyn, in the role of page-turner, he presented a varied programme, that demonstrated the capacity of our magnificent Willis organ. During the course of his introduction, Norman explained that some pieces were written specifically for the organ, while others were organ arrangements.

No organ recital could be complete without something by **Bach**. Norman played two works, the first of which has an interesting history. You would never guess from hearing Marcel Dupré's virtuoso organ arrangement, that the **Sinfonia from Cantata No. 29** began life as a violin piece. Bach himself, when writing the cantata, adapted it for orchestra and it was from this that Dupré made what we heard tonight. Note that Henry Willis, who built our organ, spent some time working in Paris with the master organ builder Aristide Cavaille-Coll. Since Dupré himself worked as an organist at a church which possessed a Cavaille-Coll organ, the sound of his music on our organ would not be far removed from what he actually envisaged. The Sinfonia was followed by a chorale prelude taken from Bach's Little Organ Book, **Christ ist erstanden, BWV 627**, which means 'Christ is risen'.

The English composer **Gerald Finzi** wrote a lovely *Prelude* for orchestra, arranged for organ by Alan Ridout. **Edgar Arro** is an Estonian composer and his output includes *Three Estonian Folk Tunes*, miniatures for organ. The *Voluntary in C* is a four-movement piece by **William Russell** who was active early in the 19th century. **Josef Rheinberger** is probably the most famous composer to emerge from Liechtenstein. Though he did teach music in the capital city, Vaduz, for most of his life he taught at Munich where he wrote many organ sonatas. Norman played the *Cantilena from the Eleventh Sonata*. This led to the last piece before interval refreshments, *Tu es Petrus in Fuga* from the *Sonata for Organ* by **Peter Tranchell**. He was Director of Music at Gonville and Caius College, Cambridge.

The name **Cecilia McDowall** is familiar to me personally for her choral music. She is a fine composer for organ, too, as we heard in *Church bells beyond the stars*. The title comes from a poem of George Herbert. **Claude Debussy** was, of course, primarily a composer for piano and it was interesting to hear the additional colours available to the organist in an arrangement of the *Arabesque No. 2*. A quirky sense of humour lurks behind the gentle music that followed. The composer, **Edith Bakfark**, came across the name Major Humpy Watson in the church of St. George, Hanover Square in London, where he was a warden at the time of Handel, a parishioner. She called the piece *Major Humpy Watson – His Frolicke*. Note that 'his Frolicke' alludes to an idea often used by composers of keyboard music during Tudor times. **Herbert Howells** wrote fine music for the organ including this *Rhapsody in D flat, opus 17 no. 1*. Perhaps less well known in this country than he should be, is **Joseph Bonnet** who died in 1944. We heard his delightful piece *Elfes*. Lastly, to end the recital in truly dazzling fashion, the *Chorale Fantasia 'Hallelujah! Christ zu loben*, published in 1901, by **Max Reger**. We in the audience were greatly impressed not only by the decibels but by the virtuosity involved in performing this music and it undoubtedly brought the evening to a resounding conclusion.
