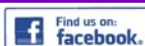

Fr Mark Stafford writes

KEEP IT LOCAL!

As a child, did you watch Ivor the Engine? The cartoon was set in Wales and everyone was known by their trade, Jones the Steam, Dai the Station, Morgan the Roundabout, Mr Hughes the Gasworks and of course, Idris the Dragon.

When I was growing up, nearly everyone on our estate had a trade or knew someone in a trade. Everyone knew a plumber, electrician, painter, builder, mechanic, butcher, baker and candlestick maker and everyone helped each other out. "Check a trade" was a discussion at the pub over a few pints of Banks's.

Generally speaking, this was a circular economy and one week someone would come and help you out and the next they would be ringing on the door and asking for your help. The jobs would be completed at the weekend or in the evening and the rate of pay for these "foreigners" was a "bung" (used to be about £25).

I have recently been reading "Soil and Soul" by A. McIntosh. At the start of the book, he looks at this vernacular economy. The term vernacular economy was coined by social thinker Ivan Illich in 1981 to describe an economy based on mutuality, reciprocity, and exchange as well as and as much as cash transactions.

For years I have considered that the development of an economy where there is a degree of reliance on the local community would be a good thing. If we were going to rely on each other, we would need to get to know one another, trust one another and become a co-dependent community.

To some degree we are currently witnessing some of the problems created by an over reliance on a global economy. I understand that if we were to become more self-sufficient, we would lose some of our freedom of choice and year-round availability of everything, but is it such a hardship just to have strawberries in summer? (I will not even start to discuss the environmental cost of flying green beans from Africa, this in itself is worthy of a future article!)

Since moving to Ewell, we have tried to embrace "village life", to be part of the local community and to have a presence in the village. I have supported the group trying to revitalise the High Street. Whilst this has been a great project and new businesses have

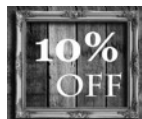

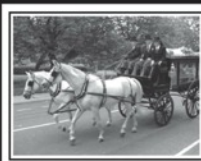

We pray for all children and their families as they prepare for a new chapter in their lives.

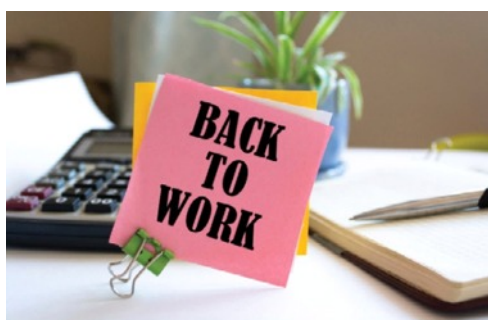
As our children start nursery or school for the first time – may they find excitement and enjoyment in new experiences.

Hi everyone!

This summer update comes at a turbulent time for the school as inflation, lack of tourists and therefore employment, and food shortages with rocketing prices are causing many difficulties.

Nevertheless the school has had its end of school year graduation day with parents and dignitaries present, including, from the Government, the Chief Minister of Communications as guest of honour. The Gambian TV were filming and there was an article in *The Point*, the Gambian Newspaper *.

Following on from our previous newsletter the Nursery desks were purchased in UK and have successfully been shipped out to the school and will be in use in time for the new school year.

Long discussions were held when we visited the school in March about building works to stop roof leaks and to maximize space. Richard has for years wanted to add senior school education and we eventually agreed to extend the build to include new rooms for senior students.

The work started at the end of term in July and it is hoped to be mainly finished by early September (see pictures). The enormous increase in prices for building material has been a concern, with BACSECT funding about half of the building cost which is around £25,000 and the rest from our private donation. We pray that prices do not overwhelm the project, which is a bit of a leap in faith!!

The school is registering lots of new pupils for the new school year and continues to help the local community with food distribution.

We are hopefully going out again in November to see the results of the building programme and to get a better feel for the impact of price rises on books and stationery, as they all have to be imported.

Here are a few pictures of the end of year celebrations and the building work.

Finally, on behalf of Richard, the teachers and all the pupils we give grateful thanks to all who help the school through both giving and praying. To know that people care is so important to all of them.

REPORT OF PCC MEETING 19 JULY

Director of Music, Jonathan Holmes, was invited to attend the meeting to explain to the PCC the advantages of the choir using the portable pews at the monthly Evensong services – mainly that they can be seen and heard properly. Following his explanation, the PCC voted for this request to be granted.

Fr Mark explained that each church should have a Mission Action Plan for the upcoming 5 years, divided into 4 sections: Community, Congregation, Culture and Commercialism (how it pays for itself). He outlined the process for formulating St Mary's Mission Action Plan, which will begin in September, with a proposed launch in January 2023.

With Covid infections climbing, the PCC considered what actions, if any, should be taken. Discussion took place around sharing the Peace and whether use of the cup at communion should be reinstated. It was decided to keep things as they are for the time being with the congregation informed of any updates via the Weekly Notes.

Valerie Wood reported that Ewell Hall bookings continue to improve. An application is being made to Surrey County Council for a loading bay outside the Hall which would assist clients with loading and unloading for events. Consideration is also being given to seeking planning permission for a crossover to allow for a parking space.

Cannon Maggie Marsh announced that, with great sadness, and for family reasons, that she had decided to leave St Mary's and to return to worshipping in her parish church, St Mary's Cuddington. Her last service would be on Sunday 31 July. Fr Mark thanked Maggie for all she had done for St Mary's Ewell.

BACH ORGAN RECITALS REVIEW

Jonathan Holmes' ongoing series of lunchtime Bach recitals continued with two more, the first on **Tuesday 14 June** and subsequently on **12 July**. We in the audience are starting to realise how unjust it is to dismiss Bach's organ compositions as dry-as-dust academic exercises. In all the places where he worked, Bach took pains to align his music appropriately with the Scriptural texts, exactly as we heard today.

Anyway, the first two *chorale preludes* of 14 June were based on the hymn *Agnus Dei*, 'O Lamb of God', familiar to us at Parish Eucharist. Firstly, **O Lamm Gottes, unschuldig, BWV 618**, 'O Lamb of God, innocent'. Equally short is **Christe, du Lamm Gottes, BWV 619** 'Christ, the Lamb of God' that came next. Two further *chorale preludes* were preceded by the **Fugue in C minor, BWV 575** which is largely for manuals only until near the end when a 'cadenza' for the pedal reminds us that Bach was celebrated in his day as an organ virtuoso. The *chorale prelude: Da Jesus an dem Kreuze stund, BWV 621* is a piece for Holy Week: 'When Jesus stood by the Cross'. **O Mensch, bewein' dein' Sunde gross, BWV 622** is beautifully written with sensitivity to the text: 'O Man, mourn thy sin so great'. Jonathan pointed out that Bach does not often oblige the player with any tempo indications, but in this piece, he wrote *Adagio* assai (very slow) then *Adagissimo* (extremely slow); perhaps as a reminder to himself. Finally, two separate works that go well together, the **Prelude and Fugue in D minor, BWV 554** and a little **Fugue in D major, BWV 580** which Bach wrote in so-called 'old style' or *stile antico* that he liked so much – polyphonic like the old Latin church music.

It was on a hot July day that we returned to the coolness of church for the next recital. We were reminded that Bach was part of a dynasty of outstanding musicians in Germany; he in his turn had a number of sons all of whom became fine musicians. The eldest son was Wilhelm Friedemann who was born in 1710; Johann Sebastian evidently had high hopes of him, for the lively **Trio Sonata in G major, BWV 530** was written for young Wilhelm to help him become a fine organist. We have heard other Trio Sonatas by Bach: a form of music of Italian origin, Bach wrote them for two keyboards and pedals. They present a challenge to the performer, in that they all demand complete independence between the three parts. Jonathan's technical ability is such that it all seemed effortless. More *chorale preludes* followed. **Komm, Gott, Schopfer, heiliger Geist, BWV 667** means 'Come, God the Creator, Holy Ghost' then three based on **Herr Jesu Christ, dich zu uns wend**, catalogued as **BWV 706, 726 and 632** ('Lord Jesus Christ, turn thou to us'). Jonathan's recital ended with the cheerful **Prelude and Fugue in C major, BWV 545** thought to be an early work, possibly dating from Bach's days at Muhlhausen.

Recycling in Surrey*

Surrey is currently the top third highest recycler in England, with a recycling rate of 55.1% (Defra, 2021). But there's still more to do - the target for 2035 is 65%.

But recycling can be complicated. At least one unrecyclable item per household goes into the recycling each week – and across Surrey's population of approximately 1.2 million that quickly stacks up!

Aside from the cost to councils and the taxpayer to correct this, it's bad for the environment and can impact the recycling rate too. A whole truckload of recycling can be contaminated and rejected because of one wrong item.

Small changes, big impact

So, if you're wanting to do your bit for the planet, here are some general pointers with a couple of free, handy resources that should help make recycling a bit easier:

Reboot your recycling know-how. It's tempting to try and recycle everything in sight, so play an interactive online recycling game to avoid 'wish-cycling'. You can find it at: <https://surreyep.recycle.game/>. This is a great one for the junior recyclers.

If in doubt, check it out. Some items look recyclable but actually aren't, even if the label says so. Use the Surrey online search tool at <https://www.surreyep.org.uk/what-to-do-with-an-item/> or download the Surrey Recycles app on the App Store or Google Play to know before you throw. Searches are based on your postcode, so you'll get an instant answer based on your area's rules (they vary across the county).

Get it sorted. Food and garden waste, small electricals, batteries and textiles recycling are collected separately in most areas, they don't go in your recycling bin.

Keep it clean and dry. No food or drink as moisture and grease will ruin cardboard and paper and make it unrecyclable. Empty, rinse and dry food and drink packaging before recycling.

Loosen up. Place all items loose – nothing in bags, sacks or bin liners. Crews need to be able to quickly see the items to check they are recyclable.

Thank you – these small changes won't cost anything, and especially not the earth!

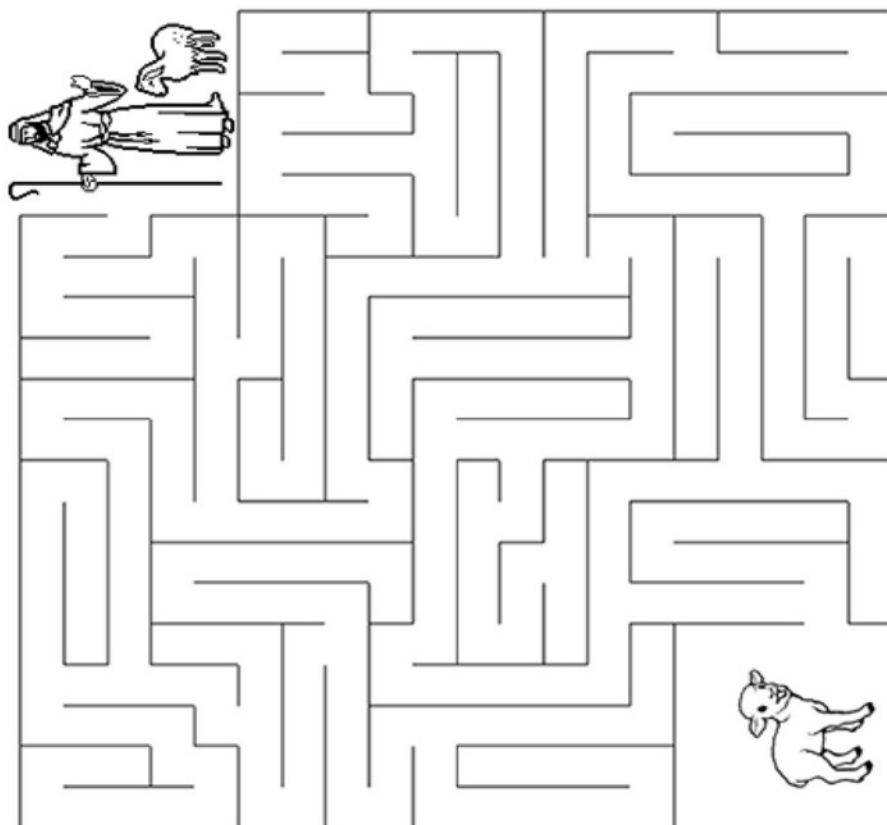
