Fr Mark Stafford writes

Christmas is approaching and the goose is getting fat.... Well, in our house it's more like...

Christmas is approaching, orders of services to be finished, sermons to be written, prayers to be thought through, posters to be created and crackers to be bought. There are more mince pies than you can imagine, and bottles of mulled wine stashed away for open house and post carol service celebrations. Snacks and treats are stacking up for the Christmas Day tea party and we need to arrange when we can see the children, grandchildren, parents, siblings and any other relatives, find time to eat and sleep and then.....

Christmas for us is a busy time and busyness is great, and we all need the adrenalin rush of a looming deadline from time to time, but for some the constant pressure of deadlines, performance reviews can be oppressive and all encompassing.

People are often on a treadmill that is racing so quickly that it has become impossible to slow down, let alone stop.

Maybe Christmas should be that time when we stop, reflect, and reposition ourselves and think about doing a new thing.

Christmas is primarily a celebration of just that, God doing a new thing. At Christmas we celebrate the birth of Jesus, we reflect on God choosing to enter into a relationship with His people in a radically new way, to rip up the old and do a different thing.

The birth of Jesus was a division in history. God changed His relationship with his people, moving from a relationship based on the Levitical law and the rule of law to a relationship based on love. At Christmas, God gave us a new way of being with him, a new experience and new insight into what it means to be fully human. Therefore, maybe Christmas, is a perfect time for us to reconsider our lives.

Many years ago, when I was considering my call to priesthood and looking for a new way of being, I found this quote from Winnie-the-Pooh very helpful, "Here is Edward Bear, coming downstairs now, bump, bump, on the back of his head, behind Christopher Robin. It is, as far as he knows, the only way of coming downstairs, but sometimes he feels that there really is another way, if only he could stop bumping for a moment and think of it. And then he feels that perhaps there isn't."

Christmas is a time when we can stop, reflect, and re-imagine our lives. Christmas is when we pause to celebrate God doing a new thing in salvation history, but also an opportunity for us to stop the bump, bump, bump and start a new thing, a new walk with God.

We have the opportunity to look at things afresh and see if the old thing, the old way of life, the old work life balance was the right way of doing things, and maybe consider doing things differently?

If you would like to have a little reflective time over the 12 days of Christmas, I have some copies of the booklet "At the heart of Christmas" to give away. The booklet has stories and reflections for Christmas and is written by both our Archbishops. Let me know if you would like a copy.

Prayers for December



'The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light' - Isaiah 9 v.2

As we begin to make our Advent journey once again, let us start by thinking about all those who are living in darkness. They may be on the other side of the world from us, or right next door. There are so many reasons for walking in darkness - fear, loneliness, oppression, depression, poverty, or violence, to name but a few. This winter, people are particularly worried by the sharp rise in the cost of living and increases in their energy bills. Will they be able to eat, and provide for their families? This year, we have seen an influx of refugees fleeing the war in Ukraine and asylum seekers looking for refuge from the terrors and oppression in their own countries. God sees all those in darkness and becomes a light for them.

Prayer

'Glory to God in the highest heaven and on earth peace to those on whom His favour rests.' - Luke 2:14

Let us stop in the busyness of our hectic lives and find peace. Let us take a moment to be still. Be secure in the knowledge that God loves each one of us and is with us. Take a moment to think about all that the message of Christmas means. Christ has come, Salvation has come, God is with us.

Prayer

Lord, thank you for loving each one of us with a love that is unconditional. Knowing that you love us, help us to share that love with others - with our family, friends, and neighbours, that that part of the world where we have influence may become a better place and we may become the people you created us to be. This year may the true meaning of Christmas remain with us, not just for a few festive days, but throughout the entire year. Amen

THE ORGANIST ENTERTAINS Simon Gregory Saturday 22 October

Simon is a well-known face at St. Mary's and it was encouraging to see such an appreciative audience for his recital tonight. It had been billed, appropriately, as 'The Organist Entertains'; this is exactly what he and the Willis organ did. Their programme was of light British classics including improvised accompaniment to a 1920s silent movie of which more below.

The evening opened with a bang. That was the *Paean* by **Kenneth Leighton.** Anyone know what a 'paean' is? I certainly did not. Judging by this piece, it may be a kind of fanfare. A Yorkshireman by birth, Leighton was Reid Professor of Music at Edinburgh University, a post which he held until his death in 1988.

More pieces by English composers followed. Worlds away from Leighton are the easy-going symphonies of William Boyce who died in 1779 and one of which we heard, the Symphony No. 1 in B flat. Edward Elgar is known for his lighter side, as well as for more serious works. Lighter works include Chanson du Matin ('morning song') originally composed for violin and piano; and *Pomp* and Circumstance Marche No. 4 in G major. William Walton, of a later generation, consciously followed Elgar's example in his own Marches such as Orb and Sceptre which was composed for the coronation in 1953 of our late Queen. Elgar was a Worcester man by birth. Some twenty miles away from Worcester is the city of Gloucester which was the birthplace and home of Herbert Brewer. The two men were well acquainted. One of Brewer's organ works is this pleasant Elegy. Benjamin Britten wrote for organ including Variations and Fugue on a Theme of Vittoria of 1946. The Spanish composer wrote much music for choirs; the theme concerned here is taken from one of his motets.

This turned out to be quite an evening for marches. **Eric Coates** wrote a *Knightsbridge March* which opened the second half. By this time, we were all anxiously awaiting the silent movie. Not just yet, though! First another march, part of the *Suite* that **Walton** extracted from the music he wrote for the film *Henry the Fifth*. Now for the silent film: *From Hand to Mouth* starring Harold Lloyd. Simon's accompaniment was entirely improvised. All were duly impressed at his skill: another proof, were it needed, of our Willis organ's versatility.

As the amusement died away, Simon brought the concert to an end in *Popular Tune* again by **Walton.** Very much a 'bright young thing' of the Twenties, Walton achieved success in his *Façade* - a series of poems recited rhythmically over extremely 'catchy' accompaniment. The poet was Edith Sitwell.

A footnote to conclude. A paean is a classical Greek word meaning 'hymn of praise (sometimes to a king but usually to the gods, particularly Apollo, who, confusingly, is sometimes called Paean). As far as I can discover, the word is not used at all in the New Testament. Knowing Leighton's reputation as a church and choir composer, 'paean' in this context must refer to praise to God.

GOING DIGITAL



St Mary's has taken steps in the last few weeks to improve the quality of its phone service and to introduce Wi-Fi to the church. Gone are our old analogue copper phone service with, at times, poor audio quality, and our slow copper internet connection. The church is now running on the latest high-speed digital optical fibre technology.

The quality and reliability of St Mary's streamed services should also benefit from our improved internet access.

Free BT Guest Wi-Fi is now available in church. Just search for and select BT_Guest_Wi-Fi on your mobile, laptop or other device, click on the BT page to accept terms, and you will connect automatically. No password is required.

The new Wi-Fi service in church will be of great assistance to those attending events and meetings as well as to anyone else who needs to be online. Another benefit of moving to the new system is that we have been able to halve our monthly payments – a saving that was very welcome in the present financial climate.

Free BT_Guest_Wi-Fi has also been available for about a year in Ewell Hall and it has proved useful and popular with our hirers and other hall users.

PARISH CHOIR AT EXETER



The weekend 29/30 October saw the Parish Choir sing the services in Exeter Cathedral; the trip being re-arranged from 2021 as our 'booking' there was cancelled due to COVID.

The cathedral virgers gave us a lovely welcome and we settled into the Song School on the Saturday afternoon to warm up. At 4.00pm we moved into the choir stalls having already sorted out the procession order and where to go. With very little time to practice on the Sunday morning, we rehearsed all the music for both days and stopped after an hour to get a drink and get ready for Choral Evensong at 5.30pm.

There was a reasonably sized congregation for Evensong. We sang the Rose responses and the Wood in Eb (no2) setting we had sung at St Mary's the previous week. The anthem was the lovely setting of "Expectans expectavi" by Wood to keep a composer theme going. It was lovely to see some familiar St Mary's faces at the service and we thank them for coming to support us.

After the service, we went on to have a lovely meal together at a restaurant in the city centre. When we had finished, we went our separate ways – to accommodation booked.

We arrived back for an 8.30am start in the Song School and ran over the music for the Eucharist going over to the cathedral for a short rehearsal before the service at 10.00am. With a large congregation present in the nave, we sang the Hassler Mass "Missa Secunda", which is well known to the St Mary's congregation, and, during the Communion, "Fear not, O Land" by William Harris as the theme was Harvest. The service was live-streamed, and you can listen to it online if you are interested.

During the notices to the end of the service we were thanked very warmly by both the clergy and congregation. I don't think we have ever received a round of applause when singing in a cathedral before. Very nice! We joined the congregation after the service for coffee and were really pleased to have so many compliments as they genuinely appreciated our efforts. We then wandered off in groups to find lunch.

We were back in the stalls at 3.00pm to practice for Choral Evensong at 4.00pm. Sunday evening saw a goodly sized congregation. We sang the Rose responses again and the Noble in A minor setting we had sung at St Mary's the previous month. The anthem was "Give us the wings of faith" by Bullock (a previous Director of Music at Exeter) to give a hint at the feast of All Saints the following day.

We waited for the congregation to disperse so we could have a photograph to record our visit then packed everything up and made our way to our cars and the long journey back along the A303. The weekend went very well, and we kept St Mary's reputation at its high level. Worcester Cathedral is next in May!


REMEMBRANCE SUNDAY 2022

Think of caring for God's creation as you do your Christmas shopping Do's and don'ts for an Eco Friendly Christmas



- **Don't** buy cards and wrapping paper with glitter or foil on. (They can't be re-cycled.)
- **Do** buy cards and wrapping paper made from recycled or FSC (Forest Stewardship Council) certified paper.
- **Don't** use plastic ribbon and tape or foil-backed wrapping paper. (They can't be re-cycled.)
- **Do** use material or string to wrap your gifts.
- **Don't** buy single plastics gifts.
- Do look at the materials gifts are made from and keep sustainability in mind. Ensure wood and paper gifts are made from recycled or FSC certified materials. and look for things like organic-certified food and clothing.
- **Don't** buy gifts with lots of excess packaging, especially if it's plastic and can't be re-cycled.
- **Do** buy gifts with little or no packaging. Sometimes shopping local can help with this, especially if you have a local refill shop. If you must use packaging, use recycled or recyclable materials. Shopping local or using public transport reduces carbon emissions.
- **Don't** buy gifts that may not be wanted just for the sake of it.
- Do consider giving an experience, which will reduce demand for physical resources. Make a gift of your time by visiting someone or by bringing people together; buy tickets to shows, concerts or events; make a restaurant reservation or give a gift card or plan a day out to a National Trust or Wildlife Trust or Wetland Centre location. It means Christmas comes twice for the receiver, when they get to go on the experience!
- **Don't** forget your reusable bags to carry all your shopping home!?

If you're more inclined to shop online, consider buying from organisations that support wildlife and the environment. WWF, Surrey Wildlife Trust, the Woodland Trust and Wetland Centres are a few to choose from.


