# Fr Mark Stafford writes

Have you bought a Valentine's Day card for your nearest and dearest?

The tradition of sending greetings cards seems to go way back in history. It is thought that the ancient Chinese exchanged messages of goodwill to celebrate a New Year and that early Egyptians used papyrus scrolls to send greetings to each other.

It may not have been until the 1400's that the Europeans began selling and exchanging handmade greetings cards, there are records of a Valentine's Day card having been sent in 1415.

However, in 1840 with the arrival of the penny black stamp, cards began to become more popular.

In 1843 the first known Christmas cards were published in London when Sir Henry Cole hired the artist John Calcott Horsley to design a holiday card for his friends.

Since this time, the sending of cards for almost any and every occasion has become the norm and Hallmark and Moonpig have turned this tradition into massive business.

But why is it so important to us to send and receive cards? Cards remind us that someone is thinking of us, they are a sign that someone cares and has had the forethought to go out and choose a card, to write it and send it. We have been remembered and the card is a visual sign of that remembering. Receiving cards is all the more poignant when they are received from people you are unable to see, a reminder that out of sight does not mean out of mind.

On Valentine's Day we think of love and the ultimate love is the love that God has for each and everyone of us. A love stronger than death, a love that knows us and understands our every joy and sorrow. God longs to hear us, for us to communicate with Him, to share our lives with Him, to hear our prayers.

Since we have moved to Ewell some people have commented that they have heard the Church bell ringing at 9am each morning.

The ringing of the bell is a little like a greetings card. It is a reminder that someone in the Church is praying for you.

The bell is rung each day at 9am, when the clergy go to Church reminding our community that we are praying for them, and for you.

The bell is also a call to prayer to remind people that they can come into Church to pray. The Church is open for prayer from Monday to Saturday at 9am and all are welcome to come and say Morning Prayer in Church. The service is also live streamed through our Facebook

# BACH & A CHRISTMAS CRACKER

6 & 10 December

Jonathan and Sarah Holmes

By all accounts, Christmas in eighteenth-century Germany was a pretty rumbustious affair. Bach's services would have been much in demand; no doubt he had to rush from one function to another.


Tuesday 6 December saw the last recital for the year of Jonathan's ongoing exploration of Bach's oeuvre for organ. Four works today: two shorter works flanked by two largerscale ones. Earlier in the series, we learned how Bach came across the work of Antonio Vivaldi. Today, we encountered another Italian, whose music penetrated beyond the Alps - Arcangelo Corelli. Bach certainly knew his sonatas for two violins and continuo, i.e. harpsichord, though exactly how he became acquainted with them is not known. Clearly, they impressed him enough for him to transform one into the Fugue in B minor BWV 579. The suite of movements that we know as Pastorella BWV 590 contains a hint of Christmas spirit, at least in the 'Prelude'. The other movements are 'Allemande', 'Aria' and 'Gigue'. Partite diverse sopra 'Christ, der du bist er helle Tag'. BWV 766 incorporates variations on a Chorale -a Lutheran hymn -"Christ, thou art the bright day'. Lastly, the Prelude and Fugue in E minor, BWV 533. This is a showpiece by young Bach, designed to impress the church authorities at Arnstadt where he had been appointed organist.

Jumping to the twenty-first century, we come to Christmas Cracker. Success at last year's event, led to a repeat performance today. Sarah and Jonathan again presented a programme of organ solos and duets, interspersed with audience carols displayed on the big screen. Proceedings were opened with Christmas Fantasy, by Jonathan Scott. Scott is on the teaching staff at the Royal Northern College of Music and the piece received its first performance at Bridgewater Hall, Manchester in 2013. Ian Tracey is another young English composer, and is organist at Liverpool Cathedral; we heard his Variants on 'We Three Kings'. Next Charles Callahan in Christmas Fantasy: organ duet where there is plenty of opportunity for the hands to clash. Then audience participation to lead us to the interval: Twelve days of Christmas, Rudolph the Red-nosed Reindeer, Sleigh Ride and It's Beginning to look a lot like Christmas.

Sarah and Jonathan's duetting skills were called into play again in a piece by another up-and-coming composer, this time an American, Robert Hobby. It was "God Rest Ye Merry Gentlemen". Of an older generation is Leroy Anderson who achieved fame between the wars in such pieces as Sleigh Ride. The British composer Howard Blake is justly famous for We're Walking in the Air used in the film The Snowman. Denis Bedard may not be a familiar name to all, but he is a French-Canadian composer for the organ, including fine pieces like Fanfare and Scherzando from Petite Suite. By the same composer is the Toccata on 'Il est né, le divin enfant' for organ solo. The audience - not allowed to rest on its laurels - now sprang into action with Jingle Bells, Let It snow, Winter Wonderland and White Christmas. For a suitably festive conclusion, what better than the Sortie on 'Jingle Bells'; homage to Louis Lefebure-Wely? The composer is a young Italian, Grimoaldo Macchia. Note that a 'sortie' is French for 'final voluntary' and it is a clever pastiche. Lefebure-Wely was a friend of Offenbach, the composer of popular operettas, whose style is vividly portrayed in this piece.

# WHAT DO THE COLOURS IN CHURCH SIGNIFY?

One of the things I love about our country is the changing seasons. The bright, green growth of spring, and the blue skies and warm haze of summer; the wonderful yellows and oranges of autumn, and the crisp, bright days of winter. At least when it's not raining! The changing seasons give us variety, and colour, and add extra richness to our lives.

In St. Mary's we use colour to help us focus on the different seasons of the church's year. A few weeks ago someone asked what the different colours signify.

Purple is for penitence, prayer, and preparation - so it's used in Advent and Lent. White is for celebration. We enjoy celebration at St Mary's and use white to decorate the church whenever there is the opportunity! So that's on Christmas Day, Epiphany Sunday, Candlemas, Holy Saturday, Easter Day, Ascension Day, Trinity Sunday, our Dedication Festival, our Patronal Festival, and Christ the King. White is used too during the festive periods associated with Christmas and Easter and also for All Saints' Day, as well as for other feast days, except when red has a claim. Red can represent either blood or fire. So red is normally the colour of Holy Week, except on Maundy Thursday, when white is used. Red is also the colour for saints who were martyrs and for the period after All Saints' Day, including Remembrance Sunday. But red is also for tongues of flame, and so it's for any festival that celebrates the gift of the Holy Spirit, particularly Pentecost. At St Mary's, the colour rose is used a couple of times during the year, once in Advent and once in Lent, but the colour we see most often is green - the colour for growth - because we use that at all other times.

So far in 2023, the white altar frontal and hangings, and the clergy vestments, were used during the festive period of Epiphany, and when that period comes to an end with Candlemas which we'll be celebrating on 5th February, we'll switched to green. During Lent, which begins with Ash Wednesday on 1st March, the church will be decorated with purple. On Mothering Sunday, 19th March, the colour will be rose, just for the day, and on Palm Sunday, on 2nd April, we'll change to red. We shall have white on Maundy Thursday, again just for the day, and then celebrate the glorious days of Holy Saturday and Easter Day with the splendour of white!

The changing seasons of the church's year and colours will matter more to some people than to others, because each of us will find that different things help us to connect with God. I believe we should not leave outside the church the beauty and the variety of colours we see in creation, but rather use them to give honour and glory to God, and to help us appreciate the truths and mysteries of our faith.

# THE ESTATES COMMITTEE

What it does - and why New Members are required

The Estates Committee is tasked with looking after the condition, and keeping in good repair, the whole of the church property, comprising the Church Building, the Church Hall and Churchyards, so that the whole can function as intended.

In order that it is performing this task adequately and correctly, every five years there is a thorough check and survey, known as a Quinquennial Inspection, carried out by a Diocese recommended architect or surveyor, of the Church building and grounds, and who prepares a report on the condition of these – adversely, if necessary (although I am very pleased to say that due to the dedication and hard work of the committee members we have never received other than commendations for the manner and good order in which the property is kept).

There is such an inspection due later in this year, and depending on what is found the recommendations are normally categorised in order of priority, namely, urgent, within the next 18 months, within the next five years, and long term & desirable.

The Committee then has to decide for each the above categories, which tasks the committee members can undertake themselves – obviously all dependent on the time required and available, and the skills required – thus saving the church from unnecessary expenditure; or whether, and when, it will be required to prepare specifications and invite tenders from contractors for the remaining necessary works.

Which brings me to the main purpose of drafting this appeal.

Over recent years the committee size has not only reduced in numbers, but, as readers will realize, age has also inevitably crept up on us, and we could do with a few new members to assist with the tasks with which we are continually faced. The Committee has been in hibernation during the Covid period, but hitherto, and in continuation, has normally met in the evening about five times a year.

Whilst any do-it-yourself skills would be very welcome, no particular expertise is required, or necessary. The main ingredient required is the willingness to assist in, or supervise, relatively straightforward tasks, thus reducing the church expenditure, and in maintaining the premises and surrounds in good order and condition. Should you consider that you can assist in any way we would be delighted to hear from you, and do, please, contact or E-mail either the undersigned, or one of the churchwardens.

# St Mary's Environmental Policy

To take St Mary's forward on our journey of being an Eco Church, which began on 10 July 2021, the PCC approved on 17 January an Environmental Policy for St. Mary's. The policy was drafted by a working party from our ECO Group and subsequently approved with minor modifications by the full Group on 22 November. The policy has the full support of our clergy and is available on the church web site in the same way as our Safeguarding and Data Protection Policies.

Both as Christians and as a church we are stewards of God's creation. As well as explaining why this is the 'foundation stone' of our Environmental Policy the document sets out our aims for the various areas we plan to address and outlines some of the mechanisms to be used. The lists of these are not exhaustive and are intended to illustrate what might be possible for us and the decisions that we have taken already. The policy will be supplemented with detailed plans and reports for the different areas where we can fulfil these commitments as they develop over time. Where possible, these will have realistic timelines and completion targets.

Essentially we want to ensure that decisions about St Mary's are made bearing in mind our responsibility to better care for God's creation with one consequence being that we shall make a difference for the better to climate change.

We acknowledge that the problems that our world faces can seem overwhelming but that the small steps our church and each of us take as individuals are worthwhile and will make a difference. The Eco Group is chaired by The Revd. Sue Ayling and the other members are Fr Mark Stafford, Helen Crossley, Denise Donovan, David Dance, Mavis Macaskill, Angela Spragg and Bridget Stevens.

It had delayed its reopening after the summer holidays to try and get the building work finished but the exceptional heavy rains prevented a lot of days working so work halted at the end of September.

It is apparent that the unusually heavy rainy season has caused damage to some of the buildings' foundations and substantial work to repair and protect for the future will have to be done. After a great deal of discussion with Richard, the Headmaster, we have agreed to personally fund the work which will be done over the Christmas period. The cost of this work will not be underwritten by the charity but it will mean that the work on the new classrooms will have to wait for the time being.

Using some BACSECT funds we were able to purchase school books and paper which was needed for the end of year exams. We also were able to settle outstanding invoices for printing work.

It is good to be able to spend in The Gambia as it supports their economy and we continue to build excellent relationships with school stationery suppliers.

Over one weekend we arranged a food distribution to the local community from the school and a representative from the Ministry of Education came to see how the school was assisting the local area. It was a very good opportunity to get feedback from the Ministry Official who confirmed that the education the children were getting was of a very high standard.

The Minister of Education asked the representative to

press upon us the need to complete the additional classrooms so that senior school education could expand. The government is very keen for this to happen because of the high standards set. That is very good to hear but it will need the school, through BACSECT, to invest in more teachers of a higher level and more books and equipment.

Success breeds more problems but they are good ones and we will endeavour to fulfil all the schools requirements as it continues to grow and flourish.

We took out with us a large sports bag full of sports equipment, mainly footballs, basketballs and pumps. The school is very keen to get some team strips for the football teams so if anyone knows any youth football teams that have a spare kit they could donate, size age 6 to 11, please do get in touch. We are still able to ship items out from UK although the costs have almost doubled in the last twelve months!

We will be back at the school in January and March and will particularly be monitoring the effect of rapidly rising prices. Most of the equipment used by the school is imported and prices have nearly doubled in some instances.

Seeing all the children working hard to learn and enjoying the fact that the school is providing a safe environment for them is really rewarding. If only we could bottle their enthusiasm!!

Thank you so much for your support, both financially and prayerfully. It means everything to the children and will at least give them a chance of a better life.

Just to remind that, apart from CAF bank charges, 100% of all donations to BACSECT are spent on the school without any being used for expenses.






