# Fr Mark Stafford writes

We are all in the same boat!

I'm sure you've all heard the expression 'charity begins at home'.

I'd like us to think about this but from a slightly different point of view. What happens when charity stays at home?

Like many charities the church is reliant upon the generosity of others. The money given to the church helps to support the church here in Ewell, provide stipends for our clergy and provides for and supports the numerous other functions of the church in different parishes across our diocese.

At St Mary's we are very fortunate that many members of our congregation donate by standing order or direct debit and have kindly continued to generously give to the work of the Church through the pandemic and our current cost of living crisis. Thank you all so much for this generosity.

This year's Lent appeal was for the work of the Epsom and Ewell Refugee Network. Often the most vulnerable in our society are the ones who lives are most affected by illness, lack of resources and fluctuations in the economy and often charities that provide for the most vulnerable in society are the first to be hit by a crisis.

It is important that we don't forget our charitable giving, even though things may be difficult for us, we are likely to be in a far stronger position than many people.

Maybe as we pray, "give us our daily bread", we can think of those who have less than we do and consider how we can support them. Maybe we can volunteer, maybe make a cash donation to a charity, maybe buy some extra tinned food, and donate it to the food bank. There is collection box at the back of Church. # **ORGAN CONCERT**

# Saturday 22 March

Despite the dreary weather, a sizeable audience turned out to hear the Willis organ being put through its paces in a programme of lesser-known works. Thanks are due to Julia and Liz, assisted by Rev Sue Ayling, for running the box office and refreshments table respectively.

It is always good to meet some young composers. One of these is **Iain Farrington** who is among those commissioned to write music for the Coronation this year. It was his *Lay my Burden down* that opened today's programme. This work is a series of reflections based on African-American spirituals and traditional songs. These are as follows: *When I lay my burden down; Sometimes I feel like a motherless child; Amazing Grace; Steal Away; Every time I feel the spirit.* Equally young is **Kristina Arakelyan** who has established herself as a leading figure among modern women composers. One of her compositions is a short piece for organ called *Star Fantasy (Alleluia: vidimus stellam)* and it brought us to the interval.

It could be argued that **Charles-Marie Widor** was unfortunate to live when he did. Born less than twenty years after Beethoven, he was active pretty well up to the year of his death in 1937; by that time, the conservative style of his music had been left far behind. A whole new generation of French composers had grown up, too young to be engulfed in the cataclysm of the Great War. One example will suffice. Darius Milhaud had been a composition pupil of Widor's in 1908. The latter duly lost his temper when he found out that Milhaud's Brazilian-inspired ballet 'Le Boeuf sur le toit' was to be France's contribution to the 1922 Salzburg Festival.

Though the Toccata has become one of the best-known of all organ music, Widor is far from a 'one-trick pony'. He composed many things including songs, chamber music and ballets. Yet it is for his organ symphonies that Widor's name is still kept before the public. Perhaps the time is right for a complete reappraisal of his music.

The last of Widor's organ symphonies took up the second half of Jonathan's recital today. This is the symphony Number 10 in D, 'Romaine'. By the time he came to write it, in 1900, Widor had left his earlier style - such as the famous Toccata - far behind. He now found himself being drawn to the idea – new at the time – of plainchant in the context of public worship. The instrument he had in mind for the new symphony was the full-blooded Romantic organ that Cavaille-Coll had built at Toulouse in 1889 and Widor dedicated his new symphony "ad memoriam Sancti Saturnini Tolosensis" or, in English, 'to the church of St. Sernin, Toulouse'. This is a Romanesque church, hence the work's title. The Easter plainchant 'Haec dies' or 'This is the day the Lord has made' permeates all four movements. Jonathan was at pains to explain the close resemblance between the sound of our Willis organ and that of both Toulouse and Widor's own church, Saint-Sulpice in Paris.

# How can we reduce our food waste?

During the Covid pandemic, UK households took measures to conserve food and reduce waste. Probably this was because of a shortage in shops and a reluctance to venture out. Unfortunately, food waste has risen to pre-pandemic levels as we have returned to our previous behaviours. This means that 70% of food waste (post farm gate) comes from households in the UK, has a value of over £14 billion a year and uses 200 million tonnes of greenhouse gases (source: Food Wrap survey 2022). This is not just wasted food. To get the food we have had to use valuable resources. Animals have been transported and slaughtered, dairy producers have used electricity. Almost everything we buy uses plastic to keep it fresh and petrol to transport it. We may feel pride about recycling our food, by making sure the council bin is filled. However this in turn uses energy to transport and turn into fuel which just adds to the cost to our environ-

So how can we reduce our food waste? There are several things we can do:

- be mindful of food dates as we were during the pandemic
- grow your own food where possible
- eat seasonal foods to cut down on transport wastage
- plan a weekly menu and buy only what you need for the week (this will save you money as well)
- shop from a list and ignore "must have" bargains they are not a bargain if you don't eat them
- download the Olio food app which advertises fresh food collected by volunteers for free from retailers instead of them throwing it out
- use the Too Good To Go app which sells Magic Bags from retailers at much reduced prices instead of wasting it
- use vegetable peelings and bones to make broths, these can be canned or frozen for future use.

These are just a few ideas we can use. I am keen to find out your own ways of reducing food waste in your household. Please email me (*donovandenise9@gmail.com*) your own ideas or habits on food waste reduction to be included in a future article.

# REPORT FROM PCC MEETING 28 MARCH

The meeting began with a talk from guest speaker, Stella Wiseman, Surrey ambassador for Inclusive Church. She defined what is meant by inclusion and why some people may not be coming to church - difficulty with access, having a learning or hearing difficulty, having dementia, because of their gender, their ethnicity or their sexuality or even thinking church is 'too posh' for them. Members were asked to read a leaflet given out by Stella, in order to help them make an informed decision at the next meeting, about joining the organisation.

Fr Mark reported that there had been 60 responses to the recent questionnaire. The Mission Action Planning Group met to analyse the responses and comments. Forums have been set up to look more closely at the data and comments pertaining to various areas of responsibility. Dates have been arranged for these forums to meet and decide the way forward. At the end of this process all information will be shared at a meeting for the whole congregation.

The PCC voted in favour of requests which had been received from two families to have memorial benches placed in the churchyard.

The next meeting will be held on Tuesday 2 May 2023.

# ROGATION SUNDAY (SUNDAY BEFORE ASCENSION)

In the Anglican Church, Rogation is celebrated on the fifth Sunday after Easter. Rogation means an asking of God for blessing on the seed and land for the year ahead. It is appropriate in any emergency, war, plague, drought or foul weather.

The practice began with the Romans, who invoked the help of the gods Terminus and Ambarvalia. In those days a crowd moved in procession around the cornfields, singing and dancing, sacrificing animals, and driving away winter with sticks. They wanted to rid the cornfields of evil.

In about 465 the Western world was suffering from earthquake, storm and epidemic. So Mamertius, Bishop of Vienne, aware of the popular pagan custom, ordered that prayers should be said in the ruined or neglected fields on the days leading up to Ascension. With his decision, 'beating the bounds' became a Christian ceremonial.

Rogation-tide arrived in England early in the eighth century and became a fixed and perennial asking for help of the Christian God. On Rogation-tide, a little party would set out to trace the boundaries of the parish. At the head marched the bishop or the priest, with a minor official bearing a Cross, and after them the people of the parish, with schoolboys and their master trailing along. Most of them held slender wands of willow

At certain points along the route - at well-known landmarks like a bridge or stile or ancient tree, the Cross halted, the party gathered about the priest, and a litany or rogation is said, imploring God to send seasonable wealth, keep the corn and roots and boughs in good health, and bring them to an ample harvest. At some point beer and cheese would be waiting.

In the days when maps were neither common nor accurate, there was much to be said for 'beating the bounds.' It was still very common as late as the reign of Queen Victoria. Certainly, parish boundaries rarely came into dispute, for everyone knew them. (Do you know know where ours is?)




