

Sharing the Love of Christ, the Light of the World, with the people of Ewell



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Fr Mark Stafford writes

In 1966 the Beatles released the song "Paperback writer". In 1968 the Bee Gees had a hit with the song "Words", and in 1987 Alison Moyet released her cover version of "Love Letters". It seems that popular culture is obsessed with the need to communicate.

This need to communicate runs deeper than this, babies become fractious and frantic as they try and make their parents and carers understand what they need, teenagers constantly complain that "they are not understood", the water fountain in most offices is alive with the noise of chatter and gossip - We LOVE to communicate. There is something primeval about the need within us to express ourselves, to be understood and to understand.

Language is the foundation on which most other things are built, if you want to frustrate a project, then muddy the lines of communication. This was amply demonstrated at the Tower of Babel. Equally, if you are to gain advantage in a competition, campaign, or war, it is helpful if you can infiltrate your opponent's communications.

Communication is fundamental to building relationships and creating understanding, as I am sure we know communication is much more than the spoken and the written word.

Ray Birdwhistell, an American anthropologist, has suggested that non-verbal communication accounts for 60-70 percent of human communication, others have suggested that the figure is much higher than this, estimating it to make up 93 percent of our communications. This non-verbal component of communications was further broken down into body language (55 percent) and tone of voice (38 percent).

Whether we believe the stats or not, we can see that non-verbal communication is of significance in our understanding of one another and, unfortunately, one that is sadly missing from emails and other written communications.

For some time you have been reading weekly emails from me, some of which you may agree with, some you may find a little harder to approve of, some may have made you laugh and all hopefully helped you to think and stay connected with what's on at St Mary's.

The purpose of these emails is to keep us connected, to keep us in conversation. Communication is the building block of community, and we are a community.

Emails are great in some ways, but they lack that vital component of communication, the non-verbal. Non-verbal communication is like punctuation, without it, sometimes things can become misconstrued. "Let's eat, Grandma" is far less alarming than "Let's eat grandma"!

So, why not come and join us and share in our conversation of faith. We would love to meet you and have a full and proper conversation with you!

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Prayers for July

THE SWEET SMELL OF RAIN

Have you ever noticed the sweet, fresh smell after a downpour of rain? That 'smell of rain' is called petrichor, and it fascinates scientists.

It was back in 1965 that scientists first named it. Petrichor comes from the Greek for stone, 'petra', and the golden fluid flowing through the veins of the immortals, 'ichor'.

Petrichor is produced when raindrops form air pockets on the rocks and soil, and softly force the release of aromatic chemicals trapped there. Petrichor-scented compounds drift upwards into the atmosphere as a gas, like a glass of champagne.

The odour itself comes mainly from a chemical called geosmin, which is made by bacteria in soil. Geosmin is made by soil microbes, to fend off hungry worms. Geosmin is highly pungent, and even just five parts per trillion can be picked up by the human nose!

BACH AT ST. MARY'S

Jonathan Holmes Tuesdays 7 March and 9 May

It is most gratifying to observe how audiences at these recitals have grown over the months. Thanks to Mavis and Sue for providing tea and their wonderful home-made refreshments.

One additional recital, not reviewed here, took place on 11 April.

During the course of these recitals, we have encountered Chorale-Preludes several times. They could aptly be described as the 'bread and butter' of Bach's work as a church organist. In his programme notes for 7 March, Jonathan included an analysis of the Preludes that Bach contributed to his 'Clavier-Ubung'. Some of these are quite monumental works, as we heard today in two 'Kyrie' Chorale-Preludes. That means they are based on the prayer 'Kyrie eleison' (Lord have mercy) with which we are familiar at Sunday's Sung Eucharist. Kyrie, Gott, heiliger Geist, BWV 671 Bach's German title just means 'Lord, God the Holy Ghost have mercy upon us.' Christ, unser Herr, zum Jordan kam, BWV 684 'Christ our Lord came to the River Jordan' (to be baptized by John). Bach is never averse to a play on words. Here, in his own surname Bach ('brook' in English), we could hear the sound of babbling water in the music for the right hand.

One of Bach's organ masterpieces is the **Passacaglia and Fugue in C minor**, **BWV 582.** We have heard many fugues; how about a Passacaglia? Briefly, it is much the same, though on a grander scale, as what the English composer Henry Purcell called a Chaconne, or Ground Bass viz. a set of variations on a repeating pattern in the bass (pedals here), usually of between four and eight bars' length. Bach's youthful Passacaglia is a stupendous composition.

Turning to **Tuesday 9 May**, two large-scale works framed a variety of 'Schuebler' Chorale-Preludes, **BWV 645-650**. We have met Herr Schuebler before. He was a music publisher who, around 1748, published some of Bach's music. Today we heard the last three of the set: **Meine Seele erhebt den Herren** ('my soul doth magnify the Lord', that is, the Magnificat); **Ach bleib bei uns** ('Ah, stay with us, Lord Jesus Christ), **Herr Jesu Christ; Kommst du nun, Jesu, vom Himmel herunter** (Come now, Jesus, from heaven to earth).

One tends to think of Bach as a stay-at-home sort of man. Yet he did travel, even on foot in his younger days. In 1747 he made what would have been a noteworthy journey, from Leipzig to Potsdam which is near Berlin. Why did he want to go there? The church of the Holy Ghost at Potsdam contained a famous organ and Bach had been invited to give a recital on it on May 8. Among the works he probably played was his own magnificent Prelude and Fugue in C major, BWV 547 with which Jonathan opened today's recital. An equally fine piece is the Prelude and Fugue in B minor, BWV 544 which is Bach's tribute to a much-beloved queen, Christiane Electress of Saxony and Queen of Poland. In his programme notes, Jonathan is at pains to describe the significance of the key of B minor and its likely impact on audiences in Bach's day. Perhaps a better-known example of this key might be in 'Erbarme dich mein Gott' (Have mercy O God) in the St. Matthew Passion.

In line with the Environmental Policy at St. Mary's we aim to reduce our carbon footprint as much as we practically can. We try to safeguard and nurture God's creation and increase our community and global engagement, always endeavouring to balance our activities with the needs of our church members and the wider community.

We are registered with A Rocha as an "ECO Church" which follows the diocesan recommendations. The "ECO Church" scheme gives clear advice which we use to further our environmental objectives. Detailed guidance and suggestions are provided under the headings Worship and Teaching, Buildings, Land, Community and Global Engagement and Lifestyle. Registered churches can be recognized with bronze, silver or gold awards depending on their ECO-related actions and activities. Awards are given once the required level has been reached under each of the above five headings. We aim to steadily progress through these levels and a target was set in January of this year of achieving the bronze level within one year. We are pleased to report that St. Mary's has now reached the bronze level.

PARISH CHOIR AT WORCESTER



The Pentecost weekend (27/28 May) saw the Parish Choir sing the services in Worcester Cathedral; the trip being re-arranged from 2020 as our 'booking' there was cancelled due to COVID.

The cathedral virgers gave us a lovely welcome and we settled into the Song School on the Saturday afternoon to warm up. At 4.00pm we moved into the choir stalls having already sorted out the procession order and where to go. When we stopped, we were pleased to accept tea and biscuits laid on by the cathedral before getting ready for Choral Evensong at 5.30pm.

There was a reasonably sized congregation for Evensong. We sang the Reading responses and the Thomas Tertius Noble setting in A minor we had sung at St Mary's the previous month. The anthem was the lovely setting of "Come, O Creator Spirit, come" also by Noble to keep a composer theme going.

After the service, we went on to have a lovely meal together at a restaurant in the city centre. When we had finished, we went our separate ways – to accommodation booked a while ago.

We arrived back for an 8.30am start in the Song School and ran over the music for the Eucharist going over to the cathedral for a short rehearsal before the service at 10.00am. With a large congregation present in the nave, we sang the Hassler Mass "Missa Secunda", which is well known to the St Mary's congregation, and, during the Communion, "O Lord, give thy Holy Spirit" by Thomas Tallis.

We joined the congregation after the service for coffee and were really pleased to have so many compliments as they genuinely appreciated our efforts, as did the clergy. The ex-Director of Music of Ely Cathedral was among the congregation and was effusive in his praise. We then wandered off in groups to find lunch.

We were back in the stalls at 2.45pm to practice for Choral Evensong at 4.00pm after a well-earned break for tea and biscuits. Sunday evening saw a goodly sized congregation. We sang the Reading responses again and the Wood in Eb (no2) setting we had sung at St Mary's the previous week. The anthem was "Dum complerentur" in six parts by Palestrina; a gorgeously rich anthem for Whit Sunday.

After the service, we were presented with a facsimile copy of part of The Worcester Antiphoner [1225-1230]; this showing the last two 'Great O's' better known now as the carol 'O Come, O Come Emmanuel' and the Marian antiphon 'O Virgo Virginum'. A lovely reminder of a great weekend!

We waited for the congregation to disperse so we could have a photograph to record our visit then packed everything up and made our way to our cars and the long journey home. The weekend went very well, and we kept St Mary's reputation at its high level. Guildford Cathedral is next in August! JAZZON THE

Joan Valerie Robinson was born in Lettice Street in Fulham, 19 May 1925. She grew up in Chiswick where she lived with her mother Maud who raised her alone after her husband Alfred died aged 44, when Joan was just 16.

She went to Oxford College, a small private school in Chiswick, where she excelled in poetry and elocution, winning many competitions. She loved dancing too, attending classes outside school. Her other passion was horse riding- she regularly rode in Richmond Park, cycling from Chiswick to the Crescent riding stables at Kingston Gate.

She was 14 when war broke out, and soon after her matric exams she was evacuated to family in Leicestershire where she

briefly attended the village school. On returning to London she joined her mother working at Army and Navy stores in Victoria. During air raids she slept in the basement, which had become an underground village for the staff.

She enrolled as a member of the Chiswick fire guard, cycling around London reporting bomb damage to the fire service.

In the evenings she attended a Pitmans secretarial course where she learnt shorthand and typing.

In 1944, Joan was called up to the Ministry of Aircraft Production in Millbank and worked in the typing pool. Early in 1946 she was offered a job as personal secretary to the chairman of Berry's Electric, makers of Magicoal Fires. It took her three attempts to get discharged from the Civil Service, but she never looked back and was very happy at Berry's. She became part of the Berry family and frequently babysat for Ray and Phyllis' daughter Virginia, who later married Frank Williams, founder of the Williams Formula 1 team.

Berry's banked at Midland Bank in Victoria Street where she met Roy Rowland. They courted for a few years before getting engaged, socialising at the Conservative club in Kew, driving around in his Lloyd sports car and watching Roy play cricket. They finally tied the knot in 1957 at Christ Church, Turnham Green and honeymooned in Looe, Cornwall.

When Keith was born a year later, they moved to Ewell and Joan became a housewife. Ann was born 4 years later. After seven years in Riverview Road, her mother came to join the family so they outgrew the house, moving to Ruxley Lane in 1966.

Joan never went back to work full time, although she dabbled as an Avon lady to help pay for Ann's dancing lessons, and worked briefly in a typing pool in a factory in Surbiton. Roy sadly passed away in 1980 at 55 years old and Joan never

really recovered from his death, living on her own but with huge support from her neighbours. In 2017 Ann decided it was time to move her closer to her in Pyrford.

Joan found a great deal of comfort in the Church, especially St Mary's. She was adopted by the Pyrford church and appreciated the welcome and support she received there.

Joan loved the theatre, she was a dance mum and she was proud of her ability to recite poetry. She had an incredible memory for detail, right to the end. She was keen on education, helping her children and grandchildren go to good schools and universities. She was exceptionally honest and straight talking, not always easy to convince. She loved her family and missed them living with her.

She continued to live independently in her own home until last year when it was decided she needed live-in care.

Joan died in the Royal Surrey County Hospital on 28 April, exactly 42 ½ years after the loss of her husband and just short of her 98th birthday. A long life, well lived.





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
