Legacy gifts should be left to the PCC and not to the Vicar or churchwardens. It is a great help if these gifts are left for the general purposes of the PCC and not for a specific appeal or project which may have ended by the time you have died.

The PCC can discuss with the executors of your Will how your gifts can be utilised at that time. This can be a wonderful experience, as both parties can discuss areas of the church's work that interested you. For example, this could be music, buildings and facilities, or children's work.

AUGUST PCC MEETING

Fr Mark reported that the Finance Committee had met with the Archdeacon to discuss the church's monthly deficit and how we can manage this. The Archdeacon was asked about how other churches meet their Parish Share. He informed them that most churches meet their running costs through weekly giving, and that it would not be possible to suspend paying our Parish Share. However, if the situation continues to worsen, the diocese would be willing to offer advice and support but could not reduce our Parish Share while we still have capacity to pay, as, unlike many diocese, Guildford does not have any historic wealth and is totally reliant on Parish Shares to maintain its functions.

At the meeting several scenarios for thinking about maintaining the Parish Share in the future were discussed:

- 1. Increase giving and meet the Parish Share.
- 2. Reduce the Parish Share by sharing ministry with another church.

It was pointed out that we have four years grace as we are currently funding the Parish Share through banked funds. However, we need to use this time wisely to create a lasting strategic financial plan. The Mission Action Plan proposes the setting up of a task force to look at finances and especially to increase giving.

3. Reducing our church expenditure

Fr Mark explained that we have 16 war graves – at least one in churchyard 1 and the rest in churchyard 4. The PCC passed a resolution to install notices provided by the War Graves Commission at the lych gates of the church and churchyard 4 indicating the presence of war graves within. Since we are in a conservation area, the council's Conservation Officer would have to be consulted prior to the installation.

It was also reported that the blinds in the Hall were due to be repaired within a few days. The next meeting will be held on Tuesday 3 October.

Thought on Christian pilgrimage

Who is PERCY WHITLOCK?

Those readers of EPN who are familiar with St. Mary's church services, may well have come across the name Percy Whitlock. It is not a familiar name; you may have wondered who he is.

Whitlock is one of those English composers who did so much to help resurrect English music from the doldrums in the early years of the last century. A generation younger than Ralph Vaughan Williams, he was born in the same decade as Benjamin Britten and William Walton. These two are household names, yet Whitlock remains relatively unknown.

I think there are a number of reasons for this lack of awareness. One is his early death. It has often occurred to me that, whenever a composer dies, some kind of reaction sets in, which can last for some time, as a result of which his, or indeed, her, music tends not to be played. An example of this is Vaughan Williams himself who, after his death in 1958, became virtually forgotten for years. During this period of abeyance, as it were, only a handful of his works were played. Unlike Vaughan Williams, Whitlock died young, just short of his forty-third birthday. It may be that his musical style at the time was considered too conservative for musicians of the Forties and Fifties.

Another reason for his subsequent lack of appreciation is that he may have spread himself too thinly, so to speak. By this I mean that he attempted to combine two careers simultaneously, which may not always be successful. Whitlock's own background lay in the field of church music. Originally, he had been a chorister at Rochester Cathedral then went to the Royal College of Music where he was taught by Vaughan Williams and the indefatigable Charles Villiers Stanford. He moved to Bournemouth in 1930, married in 1931 and was appointed Organist at the High Anglican church of St. Stephen. All that was one 'string to his bow'. Alongside this, he was appointed Municipal Organist of the Borough of Bournemouth and, by virtue of this, full-time organist at the Pavilion Theatre. This instrument was, in the Thirties, something of a pioneer in the world of theatre organs in its novel use of percussion stops.

Clearly, Whitlock enjoyed all three activities.

He was still working as a theatre organist at the time of his death. Duties included playing the organ during 'silent' movies, at the outset, but later on playing 'pops' and dance music. This seems to me worlds away from church organ work. He relished this life, too, touring England giving recitals on cathedral organs and broadcasting on the BBC. In his lifetime he acquired a considerable reputation as a concert organist and as composer for choir and organ.

One of his most celebrated compositions demonstrates just how broad Whitlock's tastes were. This is the anthem "Here O My Lord, I See Thee Face to Face", one of *Three Introits* written in 1930. You may have heard it sung by St. Mary's Parish Choir. The music is good. The remarkable fact is that the Rev. Horatius Bonar, who wrote the text, was a Scottish Free Church minister at Kelso in the Borders. Whitlock must have felt some kind of affinity with the text.

ST. MARY'S ECO GROUP Pen Recycling



Billions of pens are purchased and disposed of each year. Each year BIC alone sells over 8.76 billion items.

If you don't recycle pens they end up in landfill. It can take up to 10,000 years for plastic items to fully decompose depending on the type of plastic used. That's a long time to wait for the earth to clean up after us!

What can we do to help?

We often mention TerraCycle in our ECO tips and Terra-Cycle have combined forces with BIC ® Community Champions to provide pen recycling. The Writing Instruments Recycling Programme accepts any writing instrument with the exception of wooden pencils, glue sticks, erasers, rulers and chalk. Recyclable products include biros, ink pens, felt tips, highlighters, markers, correction fluid pots, correction tape, mechanical pencils and eraser pens. At St Mary's we now have a box at the back of the church for you to deposit these items and we will take them to the appropriate TerraCycle collection point. Rather than throwing out your old pens and other writing products, bring them to St. Mary's It couldn't be easier.

What Happens to Your Old Pens?

Pen recycling works like many other recycling schemes. Once the pens are collected, TerraCycle clean everything, separate the materials and melt them down into plastic. These plastics then re-enter the supply chain to be made into other products, preventing millions of tons of waste from entering landfill.

CHOIR VISIT TO GUILDFORD



The last weekend in August saw the Parish Choir sing the services in Guildford Cathedral.

One of the cathedral vergers welcomed us and we settled into the Exhibition Room to robe. At 3.30pm we moved into the choir stalls having already sorted out the procession order and where to go. When we stopped, we were pleased to be able to go to the Crypt and have some tea before getting ready for Choral Evensong at 5.00pm.

There was a reasonably sized congregation for Evensong. We sang the Reading responses and the Healy Willan setting in Eb we have sung at St Mary's and elsewhere previously. The anthem was the lovely setting of "Te lucis ante terminum" by Henry Balfour Gardiner; a particular favourite.

We arrived back for an 8.30am start and ran over the music for the Eucharist going into the cathedral for a short rehearsal before the service at 09.45am. With a reasonably large congregation present in the nave including members of St Mary's, we sang the Hassler Mass "Missa Secunda", which is well known to our congregation, and, during the Communion, "Here, O my Lord" by Percy Whitlock.

We joined the congregation after the service for coffee and were really pleased to have so many compliments as they genuinely appreciated our efforts, as did the clergy. We then wandered off in groups to find lunch.

We were back in the stalls at 4.15pm to practice for Choral Evensong at 6.00pm after a well-earned break for tea and biscuits. Sunday evening saw a pleasing number in the congregation. We sang the Reading responses again and the William Byrd's Second Service setting we had sung at St Mary's the previous term. The anthem was "And I saw a new heaven" by Edgar Bainton.

We waited for the congregation to disperse so we could have a photograph to record our visit then packed everything up and made our way to our cars and the journey home. The weekend went very well, and we kept St Mary's reputation at its high level with both the Dean and the Precentor enthusiastically encouraging us to come back to sing "soon". Wells Cathedral is next in 2024, then Llandaff!

REPORT FROM OUR TREASURERS

As we move into the autumn months of 2023, we can look back on a busy year as the church continues to increase its activities after the difficulties of recent years.

Introduction

The financials for the last 8 months to end of August do continue St. Mary's trend of overspend but there are some areas of improvement.

The 8 month period's loss comes to £35k and this has reduced our cash at bank to £365k down from £400k at the 2022 year end.

If we extrapolate the loss to the end of the year (for income and expenditure where extrapolation makes sense) we expect to end up with a loss of somewhere between £55k to £60k. This will be a £15k to £20k improvement on 2022 and brings us more in line with the losses being made by the church prior to Covid.

As in previous years, as a church, we remain reliant on generous legacies and extraordinary donations in order to meet the running costs of the church and hall along with the amount owed from the parish share to the Diocese.

Draft analysis

It is important to note that our analysis is based on extrapolation of figures to the end of the year.

For income we anticipate giving to see an increase, including gift aid donations of around 5-10% year on year, for which we are extremely grateful.

We have also seen an increase in activities and one-off events which has brought in increased resources to the church, along with the first year of the Ewell Village Fair since it stopped for Covid. This brought in an additional £4.7k profit which is significantly down from the pre-Covid income from the Fair of around £10k. It was in fairness a less than perfect day weather wise and we feel this is a good start and look forward to an even more successful 2024 for this key event, whilst being incredibly grateful to all those who put the 2023 Fair together and ran the event.

Ewell Hall takings are predicted to be slightly down compared with last year, and we'll need to assess the reasons behind this and see if this is a downward trend after a large contribution from the Hall last year. The Hall continues to add to our church's profitability and remains a valuable asset.

We anticipate that overall costs will be in line with prior years. This is despite an increase in our parish share contribution to the Diocese, which is our largest individual cost and is over £90k.

We have so far been lucky not to have had some of the significant essential costs incurred in 2022 around security and the churchyard. There is little we can do about many of the costs we incur, and we continue to only incur costs where they are considered a necessity or will provide additional income overall for the church. In reality we have been fortunate not to have had to spend anything on any major works, so we should be aware that at some point something important is likely to require significant maintenance.

Our energy costs will remain the same as in 2022 and come to over £15k. This is a huge amount of money and an area where investment in energy efficient solutions may make a lot of sense. Insurance costs remain significant but in line with the total cost for 2022, which is a relief given the amount insurance premiums have been increasing generally.

Summary

In 2023 we will continue the trend of making a loss but we have seen some positive trends in 2023 and we should continue to work on these in order to balance our church's incoming resources with its outgoing resources.

In the current environment the cost of running the church is likely to continue to rise and with little we can do to impact our costs it is clear our focus should be on increasing attendance at church and activity and awareness within our parish.


