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Fr Mark Stafford writes

Oren Harari is credited to have said "the electric light did not evolve from the continuous improvement of candles". The quote reminds us that whilst certain functions and needs exist and will always exist, such as the need for light; the delivery of these might need to change and new ways of fulfilling these needs be found.

Christmas is all about God doing this, since the beginning of time God has enjoyed being in relationship with his creation, but humanity fell away from this relationship and rather than being in the presence of God, we strove to go it alone. God tried through laws, prophets, fire, cloud and burning bushes to get our attention again, but we ignored this, so he decided to send his Son into the world to be a perfect example of humanity, securing for us a way to be in relationship with God our Father, blessed by the Holy Spirit. Jesus was given to us as a model of how to live our lives.

Christmas for some is a time where they gather together family and friends, to crack open the odd bottle of fizz and to enjoy being in each other's company, for others it's a time of parties and revelling, others enjoy the build-up, hitting the shops and hammering the credit cards. For Christians, it can be a bit of all of the above, but mostly it is a time when we stop and reflect on the great mystery of faith, when we consider the awesomeness of God taking human form and entering into his creation.

Christmas is also a time of spiritual challenge! The historical person of Jesus is not too controversial, and there are lots of historical records of Jesus' life outside of the Bible and Christian writings. Most people who have studied the period of Jesus' life agree that the Jesus on whom the New Testament is based, is an historical figure. The Roman historian Josephus mentions the radical rabbi from Nazareth a few times (have a look on Google). However, what is more controversial is the Christian claim that Jesus is the son of God, born of the Blessed Virgin and that in some way his life, death and resurrection changed the way that people could come into a relationship with God.

I would suggest that this massive claim is one that it is impossible to "sit on the fence about". As C S Lewis wrote in "Mere Christianity" (jump onto eBay now and buy it for your Christmas Day read), "A man who was merely a man and said the sort of things Jesus said would not be a great moral teacher. He would either be a lunatic - on the level with the man who says he is a poached egg - or else he would be the Devil of Hell. You must make your choice. Either this man was, and is, the Son of God, or else a madman or something worse".

So, as you unwrap your gifts this year maybe you would like to start to unwrap the mysteries of Jesus too

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
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Prayers for December



'The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light' - Isaiah 9 v.2

Lord, thank you for loving each one of us with a love that is unconditional. Knowing that you love us, help us to share that love with others — with our family, friends, and neighbours, that that part of the world where we have influence may become a better place and we may become the people you created us to be. This year may the true meaning of Christmas remain with us, not just for a few festive days, but throughout the entire year.

THE ORGANIST ENTERTAINS

Saturday 14 October Simon Gregory on the Willis organ

Simon is well-known to all of us at St. Mary's. Despite strong counter-attractions on 14 October, a respectable audience relished his playing in a programme of serious organ music old and new and – in entirely different vein – accompanying a Charlie Chaplin silent film.

Chaplin, however, did not appear until the second half. To begin with, an example of **Bach** flexing his organ muscles, as it were. The magnificent *Passacaglia and Fugue in C minor, BWV 582* dates from about 1710 when Bach was in his twenties. Around that time, Bach had returned from his expedition to hear the famous organist Dietrich Buxtehude play the organ at Lubeck. Who knows whether the experience of hearing the great man at home, as it were, had a part to play in young Bach's developing organ style?

Samuel Coleridge -Taylor died in 1912 aged only thirty-seven. In his short life, he produced over eighty numbered compositions in many genres, including the mighty cantata Song of Hiawatha and lots of lighter pieces two of which we heard next. They were *Idyll* (1901) and *Impromptu no. 1* (part of a set of three impromptus dating from 1911). These were arranged for organ by Taylor's contemporary, Arthur Eaglefield Hull.

Another composer to die young was **Leon Boellmann.** His Germanic name gives one a clue as to his place of birth, a small town in Alsace. His working life was spent in Paris, where he was appointed organist at the church of St. Vincent de Paul in the 10th arrondissment. It is likely that the magnificent organ there stimulated what is probably the most famous of his works, the *Suite Gothique* the final Toccata from which brought the first half to an exhilarating conclusion.

The name **Tomaso Albinoni** is remembered today chiefly for one work, the *Adagio in G minor for strings and figured bass* which can be heard every day in all sorts of guises. The actual composer is, however, known to be **Remo Giazotto** an Italian musicologist and expert on eighteenth-century Italian music who died as recently as 1998.

That brings us to the second half of tonight's programme and the keenly-awaited Silent Film 'The Immigrant' produced by and starring **Charles Chaplin.** In his spoken introduction, Simon outlined the history and brief plot of this film (1917). I thought the standard of acting throughout is superb, not just the stars - Chaplin himself, Edna Purviance (the second immigrant) Eric Campbell (the head waiter) and Henry Bergman (the artist) - but the smaller characters too. Equally superb was Simon's improvised accompaniment on the Father Willis.

Three organ miniatures ended the concert. Long known as Purcell's Trumpet Voluntary, the title is in fact *The Prince of Denmark's March* by **Jeremiah Clarke**. Jumping a couple of hundred years, we come to **Sergey Rachmaninov** whose *Vocalise* is well-known to sopranos all over the world. Here it was played in an arrangement for organ by Patricia Bird. She divides the vocalise 'tune' between hands and pedals. A more modern composer ended Simon's recital. **Patrick Gowers** is a film and television composer who also writes taxing works for the organ, including *Occasional Trumpet Voluntary* which brought the evening to an exciting conclusion.

WOULD YOU LIKE TO JOIN US AS WE BEAT THE BOUNDS ON 5 MAY 2024?

Beating the bounds is a great historical event. It is a centuries-old tradition, aimed at reminding everyone of boundaries that were important in their lives. During Rogationtide — the fifth week after Easter, villagers, with the rector and other local dignitaries, would walk the parish bounds. The children would carry willow wands to beat the boundary markers with, and in some ceremonies, children had their heads bumped on boundary stones to imprint them firmly in the memory.

We are very blessed in our parish as within its boundaries we have woodlands, open countryside, parks, housing estates, industrial areas and a good selection of coffee shops, restaurants, and pubs!

It would be great if on Sunday 5 May 2024, after the 9:30 service we could walk and "beat" our parish boundaries. The full boundary walk is about 8.5 miles, but there is also a possible shorter route of 4.5 miles.

May 2024 seems a long way off, but it would be good for us to know if there is a desire for bounds beating?

It would be a great opportunity for us to socialise, see bits of the parish we don't often see, thank God for all he has blessed us with, prayer walk the parish and witness to others!

ST. MARY'S ECO GROUP



In line with the Environmental Policy at St. Mary's we aim to reduce our carbon footprint as much as we practically can. We try to safeguard and nurture God's creation and increase our community and global engagement, always endeavouring to balance our activities with the needs of our church members and the wider community.

We are registered with A Rocha as an "ECO Church". The "ECO Church" scheme gives clear advice under the headings Worship and Teaching, Buildings, Land, Community and Global Engagement and Lifestyle (see *ecochurch.arocha.org.uk*) which we use to further our environmental objectives. Registered churches can be recognised with bronze, silver or gold awards depending on their ECO-related actions and activities.

Awards are given once the required level has been reached under each of the above five headings. Earlier this year we achieved the bronze level and we are pleased to announce that St. Mary's has now gained the silver award. Congratulations and thanks to all involved.

FOOD FOR THOUGHT

During our Harvest Festival Season in October we were thinking about the many parts that make up our food production. This made me think that I should take it further and give more thought to the way in which the food I eat is affecting our planet.

Always in a rush, I tend to buy the same food from the same source without thought of the ethics behind it. We are all very aware at the moment of the increasing household bills and that, understandably, must take priority. But could I/we do more?

I have, for some time, been interested in following the LOAF principles:

Locally grown - so fewer food miles;

Organic – fewer chemicals which helps to conserve biodiversity;

Animal friendly – if you choose to eat meat, buy meat with a higher welfare standard and

Fair-trade – better prices, decent working conditions, local sustainability and fair terms of trade for farmers and workers in the developing world.

It was whilst I was looking up information on the Fair-trade website *www.fairtrade.org* that I stumbled over something I had not realised – it is possible to buy Fairtrade flowers. I love fresh flowers at home and I just buy them when I see them, maybe as a gift.

According to the Fairtrade website, Fairtrade works with flower workers in countries including Kenya, Ethiopia, Sri Lanka Ecuador and Uganda. Fairtrade flowers can be traced back to the original farm. Fairtrade-certified farms must ensure safety and working conditions for their employees. These farms receive a Fairtrade premium of 10% for every stem sold, which allows workers to invest in Healthcare, education and other social benefits.

So where can you buy Fairtrade flowers? The Fairtrade website gives a list – Aldi, Lidl, Asda, and Co-op as well as Arena flowers and Zing flowers online.

Will you swap one item in your shopping basket for local, organic or Fairtrade food? (or flowers!)

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REMEMBRANCE SUNDAY 2023







On Remembrance Sunday we were pleased to welcome the Mayor and Mayoress of Epsom & Ewell, Rob Geleit and Miss Thomasina Tanner, our M.P, Chris Grayling, members from the Royal British Legion, Rotary, officers of the Council, uniformed personnel, cadets, scouts, guides and brownies, and many more. The rain held off for the parade to the War Memorial where prayers took place. Standards were lowered at the sound of the Last Post, raised after 2 minutes silence at Reveille, followed by wreath laying.

Most then joined the Service of Remembrance, filling the Church. The choir lead the singing and the Standards taken to the altar. The Mayor read the Gospel, Matthew 5:1-10; then the poem, 'We Who Remain' by Anthony Devanny, was brilliantly recited by RSM Leo Cowley, from Glyn Freeman's CCF. Fr Mark gave a Talk, mainly addressed to three groups - firstly to Veterans and those currently serving, thanking them for all they have done to defend our rights and freedoms; secondly to People of power - use your power wisely as you have the ability to create or destroy lasting peace: 'When the power of love overcomes the love of power, the world will know peace'. Thirdly to young people - we must work together inter-generationally to create a better world; honour one another, seek the common good; use your voice. Fr Mark quoted what one of our congregation, Lloyd, had said to him some time ago: 'There will only be peace in the world when the world is godly governed'. He finished with a prayer of peace. Then followed the very moving Hymn, 'Abide with me'. The Prayers were beautifully read by Harmony and Grace of the 1st Ewell Village (St Mary's) Guides.

The Rev. Sue Ayling lead the Act of Commitment and The Lord's Prayer. Banners were collected and the choir sang the Anthem, 'So they gave their bodies'. The National Anthem followed the Blessing. Finally, Barb said The Kohima Epitaph.

Many thanks to everyone - too many to name - who took part, helped organise and attended today.

The complete service, both at the War Memorial and inside the Church, was live-streamed and well worth viewing on St Mary's Facebook page.

CITIZENS ADVICE EPSOM & EWELL

supporting those in need in our community



At the 9:30 Eucharist on 8 October we were pleased to welcome two members of Citizen's Advice Epsom & Ewell (CAEE), who gave an inspiring presentation in the sermon slot. Yvette Ball, the chair of the CAEE Trustees writes below about their visit and the activities of CAEE.

It was an honour and pleasure for myself and trustee, Andrew Heffernan, to be invited to talk at St Mary's a few weeks ago about our work for the people of Epsom and Ewell. It was a beautiful service and despite our unfamiliarity with your specific format, we enjoyed its spiritual depth.

It symbolised in a way our work at Citizens Advice Epsom & Ewell (CAEE). People come to us, often troubled and stressed, but we hope they leave in a better place mentally and materially.

Our key function is to give free, confidential, impartial and non-judgemental advice for all who live, work or study within Epsom and Ewell. There are many ways for people to get in touch: through our drop-in and outreach services, on-line, by phone and via appointment. Our work also provides (anonymised) data to the central Citizens Advice for ongoing campaigns and we gather local information for campaigns to improve policies and practices that the affect day-to-day lives of our own community.

CAEE is a local charity, established in 1939 and is part of the national Citizens Advice family. However, we operate as an independent charity and raise our own funds to run an efficient and effective organisation with 15 paid staff and 50+ volunteers who are vital for our success.

We are fortunate to partner with many organisations and our primary funder is Epsom & Ewell Borough Council. We provide significant public value - £24 return in value for every £1 invested in us with each client costing an average of £110 across a year.

So how can you get involved? You can donate, support our fundraising events or even hold your own, encourage employers to sponsor us, consider leaving a legacy, spread the word about us and of course, become a volunteer.

Our volunteers are the backbone of the organisation. Whether you are available a few hours a month or a day a week, we have a wide range of roles and plenty of opportunities to get involved.

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
