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Fr Mark Stafford writes

Many of us will remember the film 'Educating Rita'. The film drew on the relationship between an academic and a hair-dresser. In the film, twenty-seven-year-old Liverpudlian hair-dresser Rita (Dame Julie Walters) decides to complete education before having children, although her husband Denny (Malcolm Douglas) has his heart set on starting a family as soon as possible.

Rita joins an Open University literature course where her tutor is Dr Frank Bryant, wonderfully portrayed by Sir Michael Caine, who is an upper-class professor who sees life through the bottom of a whisky glass.

During the film, both Frank and Rita start to develop new ways of life. Rita grows academically and by the end of the film Frank decides to stop drinking and leaves for Australia on sabbatical in the hope of building a new and better life for himself.

In the film we watch Rita struggling to balance work, family and her dreams of gaining her education, as well as having to pay for the privilege.

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

EIGHT HANDS ON TWO PIANOS

'Eight Hands on Two Pianos' concerts have become a standard feature of St. Mary's musical life. Readers may not know that St. Mary's possesses not one but three excellent pianos, although only two were called into service tonight. The challenge for all performers is to keep in time, not only with the music but with each other; I am sure this kept everyone on their toes.

The concert opened with a bang. Tchaikovsky's rich orchestral sound in Sleeping Beauty was well reproduced by all four pianists in the Waltz from Act 1 of the ballet. A change of mood now took over, with some arrangements for piano of Spirituals by Florence Price who is probably America's leading African-American composer. Two spirituals: I Couldn't Hear Nobody Pray and Ev 'ry Time I Feel the Spirit. Next, the sparkling Finale from the Sonata in D major for piano duet, K. 382 by Mozart. The music 'sparkles' owing to the good-humoured repartee between the pianists, just like in some of the comic operas of the day. Now the Serenade in E major by Antonin Dvorak. Nineteenth century serenades differ from those of an earlier generation, like those of Mozart and Beethoven. By the time Dvorak wrote his serenade, the form had transmogrified into works that could involve full orchestra, but of far less weighty nature than symphonies; of these, the first serenade by Brahms is typical. Or they could be for wind instruments, or for strings alone, like this one by Dvorak himself. Far more serious than serenades are the works of Sergey Rachmani**nov.** A life-changing experience for him was the disastrous premiere of his First Symphony. Its reception was so bad he sought psychiatric advice before attempting any further compositions. Fifty years later, after he had emigrated to America, he completed the Symphonic Dances; he envisaged performance by either full orchestra or two pianos. It was of course the latter that we heard tonight, the fiendishly difficult music played by Simon and Jonathan. Lastly, to bring us to the interval, all eight hands joined in three movements from the Peer Gynt Suite by Edvard Grieg: Morning, Anitra's Dance and In the Hall of the Mountain King

In Brahms's day, the biggest German city east of Berlin was Breslau. Yet you will search in vain for Breslau on any modern map of Germany. That is because the city has reverted to its original Polish name, Wroclaw. Anyway, the University authorities decided to grant Johannes Brahms an honorary doctorate. As a gesture of thanks, he composed The Academic Festival Overture which ingeniously combines four cheerful student songs into a fifteen-minute piece. Then the *Notturno* from the *Second String Quartet* by **Alex**ander Borodin; four hands on one piano. All four pianists joined forces in the Waltz from the opera Faust by Charles Gounod. A Tarentelle is another kind of dance and is the title of a piece by Madeleine Dring for two pianos. Last of all, the Fantasy on Themes from Bizet's Carmen arranged by Mack Wilberg. We enjoyed this high-spirited music; in particular, the way he makes use of bitonality and polytonality: the simultaneous presentation of two or more themes in different keys. Wilberg is by no means a pioneer in this respect. Mozart is probably the first great composer to make use of polytonality – purely in fun, as today.

Lighting your home

- Light bulbs! If the average household replaced all of their bulbs with LEDs, it would cost about £100 and save about £35 a year on bills.
- Use natural light when you can to save energy. Sit by the window. Decorate your home in light colours to maximise natural light.
- Turn your lights off when you're not using them. If you switch a light off for just a few seconds, you will save more energy than it takes for the light to start up again, regardless of the type of light.
- If you have lights in your garden use solar powered lights that charge during the day and don't require electricity.

CHOIR TRIP TO SOUTH WALES



The Parish Choir was on the road again on July 26 and 27 to sing services in Margam Abbey and Llandaff Cathedral. Those travelling on the Friday experienced the usual terrible traffic along the M4!!

Saturday saw us arrive at the Abbey for an 11.30am start. The church has an amazing history (please look it up on the internet) with the current church only being half the length of the original. The occasion was the Diamond Jubilee Service at 1.00pm to celebrate Canon Richard Hanford's amazing career since being priested 60 years ago on St James' Day. Unsurprisingly, the service was intricate and lasted two and a half hours, but it was a truly lovely occasion beautifully choreographed. The setting for High Mass was the Langlais 'Missa Salve Regina' that we sang parts of at St Mary's a few weeks ago to 'get

us in the groove'. Weelkes' 'Gloria in excelsis' was the introit with the other anthems being 'O quam gloriosum' by Victoria, 'Glorious in heaven' by Whitlock, and John Ireland's 'Te Deum Laudamus', plus seven hymns.

The post-service reception in the amazing Orangery next to the Abbey was a very fitting occasion and ex-Archbishop Rowan Williams spoke eloquently about Richard's ministry. We then all went our separate ways as we had booked accommodation individually.

The following morning meant being at Llandaff Cathedral by 10.00am for a warm-up then into the cathedral to practice for the Choral Eucharist service at 11.00am. The setting was Hassler's 'Missa Secunda'; this being well known to the choir and St Mary's. The Communion Motet was Byrd's 'O sacrum convivium'. We dispersed after the service to find lunch and reassembled at 2.30pm for the pre-service practice for Evensong. It was a joy that Canon Richard joined us to act as Cantor; a role he had not performed there since leaving the cathedral post of Succentor in the very early 1970s.

Choral Evensong was at 4.00pm and we sang the Radcliffe responses, Noble's Evening Service in A minor and the anthem was Edward Elgar's 'The Spirit of the Lord'.

Post both services saw many appreciative comments from congregation and clergy alike! It is always good when people appreciate one's efforts. After Evensong the Dean enthusiastically invited us ("preferably for longer"!!).

A tired but pleased choir then wended their way back to Ewell knowing we had sung well and had received some very appreciative comments.

BACSECT NEWSLETTER No 11 JUNE 2024

Hi everyone, it's been quite a time since our last newsletter, but life has been very hectic over the last few months.

We visited the school in January and in March and are pleased to report that it is flourishing. It was a shock for us in March to find that Richard, the Headmaster, had suffered a minor stroke but we are glad to report that he is recovering well.

We had not been told between visits as there is always a reluctance to give bad news! Apart from having to have some physiotherapy and make sure he takes his pills regularly all seems to be positive, and he is firmly in charge.

The remedial work to the outer walls has been successfully completed and, we are delighted to report, done within budget, something that is quite unusual for works in The Gambia. The three new classrooms now just need some internal work to be completed for them to be operational.

Sadly, we have so far not been able to get 20+ laptops to replace the old ones at the school. We thought that a school in the UK could supply as they were updating but another charity beat us to it. There are still a few of the old ones working but not enough for the number of children. We will keep looking!!

The annual returns were duly completed when the Charities Commission website reopened and we were able to submit a return showing a sound financial state, thanks to all our supporters.

There is a need over the next year or two for quite a lot of building maintenance to be carried out. The original part of the School was built in 2008/9 and only remedial work has been carried out since that time. Our inspections in January and March clearly showed the need for quite a lot of repairs and for a full school repainting. This sort of work can only be carried

out in the school holidays and also when we have got a builder who can do the work at a reasonable price. Sadly, the builder who did emergency work on the outer walls is no longer available to us. We also need to make sure we have the funds to cover the work.

Our immediate need is to pay the teacher's salaries for the August holidays and to do the big yearly spend on purchasing the new workbooks and equipment for the new school year. All the learning books that the children use are written in during the lessons so every year a complete new set for the whole school has to be obtained. Quite a big spend on 200+ children as well as uniforms for the new intake.

All the school writing material is provided by the school to the children. Most "disappear" home at the end of a school year and have to be renewed.

Whilst we were there in March all the children were preparing for the National Assessment Tests set by The West African Examination Council. The results of the tests indicate how well the children are doing and, just as importantly, how well they are being taught. Our schools' results are always above average. The children leaving in July to go to senior school will use the results to show the standards they have reached in Junior School so the results for those pupils are very important.

The school and all the students send thanks to all who help to make their education possible.



PCC MEETING REPORT

A structural survey needs to be carried out as soon as possible. Fr Mark has contacted the Landmark Trust to see if they are interested in taking it on but has had no reply to date.

The question was asked: *How often do the council cut the grass?* – 2 cuts per year. They have to be asked to cut it so Fr Mark has it cut for the Fair and for Remembrance Day. He expressed his thanks to all those volunteers who keep it tidy for the rest of the year.

Fr Mark pointed out that the interior decoration of Ewell Hall is beginning to look a bit tired and suggested setting up a work party to freshen up the paintwork (not the ceiling) and to tidy up the weeds etc outside.

The PCC voted in favour of the ministry team sorting through the large numbers of hymn and prayer books which are no longer used but are stored at the back of the church. Surplus books will be offered to members of the congregation before being offered to other churches.

The next meeting will be held on Tuesday 10 September.

the Mouse Trail (all day).




