Fr Mark Stafford writes

Journeys of the Heart and Soul: The Power of Adventure and Reflection

I have always been a great fan of books about people's adventures, especially if they recount fantastic journeys.

Many years ago, I found immense joy in reading *Coleman's Drive*. The book recounts John Coleman's incredible drive in 1959 from Buenos Aires to New York in a 1925 Austin 7. Another great read that captured my imagination is Tim Slessor's *First Overland*, which details the Oxford and Cambridge Universities expedition from London to Singapore. This journey, one of the longest overland drives at the time, was undertaken in two Series 1 Land Rovers and is filled with adventure, mishaps, and teamwork.

As you can see, there is a bit of a theme here. I have a great passion for Austin Sevens and Land Rovers, but I believe both books are worth reading not just as "boy's own" adventures for petrol heads, but because they capture a moment in time. They are both books of discovery.

Reflecting on these two books, I realised why they meant so much to me. Apart from involving some of my favourite cars and being tales of high adventure, they were people's recollections of unique experiences that would never be replicated in the same way. These journeys were one-offs, and the authors' journals allowed me to travel around the world without ever leaving Birmingham.

In a similar way, we too have witnessed many worldchanging events, including wars, the three-day week, the miners' strike, the poll tax introduction and subsequent riots, the dissolution of the USSR, space travel, COVID-19, economic downturns, and many other significant events.

We have also experienced unique faith events, such as the appointment of new bishops and popes, the introduction of female clergy, and shifting patterns of worship. These events have undoubtedly changed our lives and the way we relate to God.

Some Christians find "journaling" to be a great spiritual exercise. Christian journaling involves taking time to reflect and record thoughts and prayers, reflect on Scripture, and track spiritual progress. Journaling can give structure to prayer time and help identify recurring issues, enabling a focus on what needs attention or what God may be saying.

If you have never tried journaling, it might be something to consider as part of your spiritual practice. It can be a powerful tool for reflection and growth.

As a teenager, I was very grateful to John Coleman and Tim Slessor. Through their journals, I was able to embark on incredible journeys without ever leaving my hometown. Similarly, I am grateful to spiritual leaders like Charles Gore and Gerard Hughes for guiding me on a spiritual journey. Their writings and reflections have been



ORGAN RECITAL

Saturday 17 May

William Brooke - Senior Organ Scholar

We at St. Mary's are fortunate in having not one but two young organists. Appointed two years ago, William is well known in the community for his regular appearances in church, accompanying choir and congregation at services. It was, therefore, a special pleasure to hear him in solo capacity.

His programme, ranging from the Baroque to modern, was designed to take full advantage of the power and versatility available to him on the Father Willis organ. Beginning with **Bach**, William played two contrasting works, the *Kyrie*, *heiliger Geist*, *BVW 671* and the ebullient *Prelude and Fugue in G major*, *BWV 541* nicknamed 'The Great'. This latter piece displays many of the characteristics of Baroque music: complexity of writing - polyphony - a high degree of ornamentation and sheer exuberance. The Kyrie piece is one of Bach's Chorale Preludes usually based on a hymn though here it is part of the 'Lord, have mercy' section of the Mass.

An older contemporary of Bach is **Louis-Nicolas Cléram-bault** who lived and worked in Paris therefore would never have met Bach. Clérambault is known for his opera but did write some organ music including the *Suite du Deuxième Ton* which we heard today. The Suite comprises seven short movements and we can but admire the way our organ can reproduce with a fair degree of approximation the kind of sound a French instrument, of that time, with an entirely different set of stops, would make.

Next, William moved to modern times. **Paul Fey** is a young contemporary German composer who performs his music on You Tube. The *Prayer for Peace* was composed in response to Russia's invasion of Ukraine in 2022. Another contemporary composer is **Cecilia McDowell** who writes for choirs and organ. Of the latter category is *Church bells from beyond the stars*, a sparkling piece dating from 2023; its title is derived from a poem by the Tudor poet George Herbert: "church bells from beyond the stars heard, the soul's blood, the land of spices, something understood."

A leading light among twentieth-century English composers, is **Herbert Howells** two of whose works featured in William's recital. Firstly, Number 6 from Howells's set Six Short Pieces for Organ and it has the modest title Quasi lento: teneremente (somewhat slowly, tenderly). Secondly, in 1910, Howells witnessed the first performance of Vaughan Williams's famous Fantasia on a Theme of Thomas Tallis. One can hear the tribute Howells pays to his friend and colleague, in Master Tallis's Testament published in 1953 as one of Six Pieces for Organ but often played as a stand-alone piece. Finally, after this restrained music, William literally 'pulled out all the stops' in the Marche Pontificale by Charles-Marie Widor. Though he died as long ago as 1937, it seems unfair that he should be remembered for just one piece, the ever-popular Toccata. This resounding March, taken from his First Symphony, deserves to be much better known.

NATURE FRIENDLY GARDENING

With over 20 million gardens in the UK, our combined efforts to work with nature rather than against it can make a huge contribution to a healthy environment. Check out the tips below from the Woodland Trust https://www.woodlandtrust.org.uk
Small changes can have a big impact. They can be good for wildlife and they're often cheap or even free so good for your budget too.

Avoid chemicals When it comes to weedkillers, fertilisers and pest control, choose organic options. Chemicals damage soil health, pollute water sources and harm wildlife. If you end up with an infestation, look to natural remedies like soapy water, garlic spray and beer traps.

Grow your own food and cut flowers Shipped around the world and packed in plastic, some of the fruit, veg and flowers in the shops have an eye-watering carbon footprint. Reduce your impact by growing your own, even in small spaces. Grow herbs on a windowsill, tomatoes in hanging baskets and strawberries in containers, or slot some food crops into your existing borders.

Reduce waste Got piles of fallen leaves? Make leaf mould to use as mulch. Branches and twigs from pruning? Leave small bundles in a quiet corner or at the back of borders as a home for minibeasts. Empty compost bags? Line wooden planters to help prevent rot. More seedlings than you know what to do with? Gift them to friends, neighbours or colleagues. And don't forget grass clippings and other plant waste can go on the compost heap.

Mow lawns less often Whether you use a petrol mower or an electric one, spreading out your lawn cuts will reduce your energy bills as well as your impact on the environment. Fewer mows has the added bonus of allowing grass to grow a little longer and wildflowers to bloom, providing valuable food and shelter for wildlife.

Water wisely For an eco-friendly garden, rainwater is better than the tap. It's also cheaper and healthier for your plants. Install a water butt or any large containers where they can catch rainwater and you'll be reducing your carbon footprint.

Make your own compost and fertiliser Composting saves the energy used to produce shop-bought, plastic-wrapped compost, and avoids the transport costs and greenhouse gasses associated with plant and food waste going to landfill or incineration. To make compost, mix layers of soft 'green' material, like grass, flowers and kitchen peelings, with drier, harder 'brown' material, like small sticks, dead stems and bits of cardboard. For DIY fertiliser, nettles or comfrey are ideal. Chop the leaves up, submerge in water and leave to rot for a few weeks, then dilute one part plant liquid to nine parts water before applying to the garden. The neat feed smells pretty awful, but it's packed with nutrients and your plants and purse will love it!

A LETTER FROM SARA HOLLAND



Dear Friends,

Firstly, I want to thank you all for the warm welcome, love, and support you've shown me over the past eight months as I've worshipped alongside you at St Mary's.

It is both an honour and a blessing to now be officially licensed as your Lay Minister. I look forward to serving you more intentionally and whole-heartedly now that my formal training has finished. Of course, there will always be more to learn and explore—and I'm sure much of that learning will happen with all of you.

I imagine many of you would like to know a little more about me. By day, I'm a self-employed bookkeeper, a role I've held for many years. Some of my clients have been with me for over 25 years and have become more like family. I have a daughter, Jennifer (33), who lives in St Helens with her husband Mike and my two beautiful granddaughters, Amelie (8) and Myla (3). My son, Benedict (26), has recently moved back home while he completes his Master's in Mechanical Engineering. In my spare time, I'm a passionate supporter of my rugby team, Esher RFC. I spent 15 years as their youth registrar, was once even named *Player of the Year* (despite never having played a match!), and I'm proud to be a Vice President of the club. I'm also an avid crafter—but more on that another time!

I've always had faith, but church attendance wasn't always regular. I grew up in the Baptist Church and, in my twenties, worshipped at the Kings Church in Aldershot, where I was baptised by immersion at age 25. Like many, life's demands drew me away, and for a time, my attendance was limited to the "hatch, match, and despatch" occasions.

Eventually, I began attending a church-based mother and toddler group, with Ben, which gently drew me back into church life—and into deeper service. Eleven years ago, I was authorised as a Pastoral Assistant, and even then, I sensed God calling me to something more.

Three years ago, that quiet inner voice became louder. I began to explore what that "more" might be, though I worried I was too old or past my prime. But a chance conversation with Sarah Slater, the Diocesan Training Lead, changed everything. I found myself enrolled in the Local Ministry Programme to train as an LLM. Then, last autumn, God brought me to Ewell.

During my training, a tutor gifted me with a single word: *Ubuntu*. It's a South African term meaning:

"I am what I am because of who we all are."

He said to me, "You will be who you need to be for those you are serving." That truth has become the very heart of my ministry.

May I serve you in the love of Christ.

JULY PCC REPORT

Fr Mark had circulated a paper prior to the meeting, outlining the progress made on MAP part 1 – what went well and what didn't and where to move on to for part 2.

The biblical literacy course during Lent had been a great success and is presently being followed up with a weekly course about being a Christian, with a view to studying the Nicene Creed later in the year.

Our new LLM Sara Holland has offered to set up a 'craft church' group, where she would lead a discussion with the members (for example on the Beatitudes) whilst they worked on a linked craft.

Fr Mark reminded members that the Bishop will lead an outdoor service on 10 August to celebrate St Mary's achieving the gold Eco Award – it was suggested that this would be a good occasion to bring along friends or family who would not normally come to church.

Thanks were recorded to Godfrey, Steve, Tim, Chris and Fr Mark for their hard work clearing the churchyard grass and grounds in readiness for the Village Fair.

Work will begin on 4 August to lift and then repair the chancel floor, and it is hoped this will only take two to three weeks. During this period the church will remain closed and church services will be held in the hall. A notice will be placed outside the church to explain the temporary closure.

The PCC unanimously agreed to adopt and abide by the Diocese of Guildford's Covenant for Racial Justice.

The next meeting of the PCC will be on Monday 11 August.


