## EPIPHANY 6 JANUARY THE GIFTS OF GOLD, FRANKINCENSE AND MYRRH

The story of the coming of the Magi grew in the telling. By the 6th century they had acquired names: Caspar, Melchior, and Balthasar. By medieval times they were considered to be kings. Whoever they were, we do know from Matthew that they brought three gifts to Jesus.

What about their gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh? While we cannot know for sure what was in the minds of first century Magi, one Victorian scholar has offered a possible explanation as to the significance of their gifts. He was the Rev John Henry Hopkins, an American Episcopalian minister, who in 1857 wrote his much-loved Christmas carol, 'We Three Kings of Orient Are'.

Gold, said John Henry Hopkins, was a gift that would have been given to a king. Frank-incense had traditionally been brought by priests as they worshipped God in the Temple.

Myrrh was a spice that the ancients used in preparing bodies for burial.

If that is true, then you could say that the Wise Men, in choosing their gifts for this infant, honoured Jesus with gold because He was King of the Jews, with frankincense because He was to be worshipped as divine, and with myrrh, because He would also become a sacrifice and die for His people.

The Wise Men were the very first gentiles ever to worship Jesus. What faith they had! They travelled for months over difficult terrain, they never saw any evidence of Jesus' kingship, His divinity or His sacrificial death. They worshipped Him through faith in God's promises about Him. Isaiah foresaw this response to Jesus: 'Nations will come to your light, and kings to the brightness of your dawn.' The Magi's eyes of faith saw clearly and far into the future.

Compare that with the High Priest and religious leaders whom the Wise Men saw in Jerusalem when they first arrived. These head priests knew all about the prophecies of their own coming Messiah, but NOT ONE Jewish religious leader travelled to look for Him in Bethlehem. And it is only six miles down the road!

### **NOVEMBER PCC REPORT**

Fr Mark reported that the diocese has selected St Mary's to be one of the 20 churches in the diocese that they will be supporting to become net zero carbon within the next two years. As a start to this process, Fr Mark and the churchwardens will be visiting Nork church to look at the infra-red heaters installed there, with a view to considering them for St Mary's.

He said that a new Area Dean has been appointed and that St Mary's will be hosting the next meeting of the Deanery Synod on 27 January, when the digital communications officer from the diocese will be explaining how churches can fundraise digitally.

It was noted that the process has begun to explore the possibility of drawing up formal leases for the Church land currently being used as gardens by two properties in Church Street. The property owners will be offered a long lease with an annual peppercorn rent. Meetings will soon be set up with them.

Fr Mark also reported that plans are being made to start up St Mary's junior choir in February and hopefully recruit further members once practices begin. There is a scholarship fund available to help support the project.

The next meeting of the PCC will be on Wednesday 28 January.

## **TUESDAY BACH RECITALS**

### Jonathan Holmes — organ 4 November and 2 December

Over the course of these monthly Bach recitals, we have learned much new musical terminology. 4 November was no exception. Here was an opportunity to hear a Double Fugue. We often meet 'conventional' fugues, where the tune or 'subject' is 'subjected' to a series of repetitions at both pitch and time. One of the most magnificent of Bach's organ works is the Prelude and Fugue in E minor, BWV548 nicknamed the 'Wedge'; it is a single fugue and one where it is down to the skill of the composer that this music sounds both harmonious and interesting. A Double Fugue occurs when, as well as the principal 'subject', the composer brings in a second subject. This can be done in one of two ways, either simultaneously with the first subject, or later. Readers who are choral singers will be familiar with the first type. The second 'subject' of the Kyrie in Mozart's Requiem enters at the same time as the first. Mozart was a master of fugue, as witness the Finale of his 'Jupiter' Symphony.


Jonathan's November recital began with a Double Fugue, the Fugue in C minor on a theme of Legrenzi, BWV574, Giovanni Legrenzi was a Venetian composer of an older generation; his theme is short and terse somewhat like Beethoven's. Bach very soon combines both his 'subjects' into a complex and abrupt ending. We also heard some Chorale Preludes. Two are based on the same humble prayer, Liebster Jesu, BWV 730 and 731. 'Dearest Jesu' in English. These two pieces were flanked by two more on an identical German text: Valet will ich dirgeben BWV 736 and 735. 'Farewell I gladly bid thee' in English. Lastly the superb 'Wedge' Prelude and Fugue as aforesaid.

No double fugues featured in Jonathan's December recital. Since it is Advent, it is appropriate to include a selection of short chorale preludes written for this and the Christmas season. It was instructive to hear the wealth of sound colour available to the organist by judicious choice of organ stops. Most of these preludes have texts in German though one or two are in Latin. Here they are:

Nun komm, der Heiden Heiland, BWV 599; Gott, durch deine Gute, BWV 600; Herr Christ, der ein'ger Gottes-Sohn, BWV 601; Lob sei dem allmachtigen Gott, BWV 602; Puer natus in Bethlehem, BWV 603; Gelobet seist du, Jesu Christ BWV 604; Der Tag, der ist so freudenreich, BWV 605; Vom Himmel hoch, da komm ich her, BWV 606; Vom Himmel kam der Engel Schar, BWV 607; lastly the familiar Christmassy In dulci jubilo, BWV 608.

To round off an excellent recital, Jonathon finished with Bach's exuberant *Prelude and Fugue* — not double! — *in D* major, BWV532 which exploits to the utmost the player's dexterity on both hands and feet.

#### A REFLECTION ON THE LORD'S PRAYER

## SING IN OUR CHOIR




